SUBJECT:

Possible Ballot Items for the November 2019 Election

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

The purpose of this item is for Council to hold a discussion on potential questions for the November ballot.

BACKGROUND OR DETAILED INFORMATION:

Transportation Funding:

On June 24, staff met with members of the Citizens Transportation Finance Committee to discuss the possibility of the City moving forward with a transportation funding ballot question in the Fall of 2019.

The committee recommended the City pursue a funding strategy for a series of projects around the community that would enhance transportation capacity. The committee's recommendations were as follows:

- \$50-\$70 million debt authorization
- Utilize TABOR excess (after 2022) and funds currently allocated to service the Riverside Parkway (after this debt is paid off) to service the new debt
- Ballot question November 2019

Key projects identified by the committee included 24 Road widening and the F 1/2 Road Parkway from Market Street to Patterson. Prioritization of other capacity improvements for the City's transportation network is currently underway to fit the proposed authorization.

A Community Meeting was held on July 31st. The meeting was attended by several members of the community and received media coverage. Feedback was provided on the transportation options discussed.

Charter Amendment for Length of Leases of Public Property:

The provision of the City Charter that limits a lease of public property to no more than twenty-five years may be unduly restrictive. As such, increasing the term from twenty-five to ninety-nine years for certain property(ies) may benefit the public by allowing the highest and best use of the property(ies) and contribute to economic development in the community. Leasing of any public property is permissive and within the sole and sound discretion of the City Council.

Feedback was provided at the community meeting held on July 31st.

The proposed timeline for bringing questions to the voters in the Fall of 2019 is as follows:

- June and July: Committee input
- August 5: City Council Workshop
- August 6-20: Committee revisions
- August 21: City Council adoption of final language
- November 5: Election Day

FISCAL IMPACT:

The City Clerk's 2019 budget included \$33,000 for a November election. Staff has requested an estimate from the Mesa County Election's department for the cost to participate; they will have an estimate once they know how many entities plan to have a question on the November ballot.

SUGGESTED ACTION:

City Council discussion and direction to staff.

SUBJECT: Transportation Capacity Expansion – Next Steps

Despite the failure of question 2A, the City's transportation needs have not gone away. Following a memo issued to City Council on May 9, 2019, staff has formed a Citizens Transportation Finance Committee that allows members of the community to review information and help formulate a ballot question. The committee met on Monday, June 24, and the following information summarizes the meeting.

Transportation Projects – Projects that received support included 24 Road, F ½ Parkway and the reconfiguration of the Riverside Parkway/24 Road Interchange. There was also discussion about geographical distribution of projects to bring some of the farm to market roads up to urban collector standards complete with turn lanes, bike lanes, sidewalks, and streetlights. These projects were proposed in areas of the City such as Orchard Mesa, Pear Park and the Northeast area. In an effort to prioritize the projects discussed by the Committee, the table below organizes the projects into two tiers that total approximately \$57.8 million. These lists are still evolving, and staff is still evaluating the projects.

Tier I projects identified in the table are projects that have the greatest need for improving circulation and expanding the capacity of the transportation network within the City. Tier II

projects are projects that are not immediately identified as critical to improving the City's transportation network capacity. Feedback is appreciated on the tiered lists as they are still evolving.

Financing Transportation Projects – The committee indicated that the City should look at TABOR excess funds and the reauthorization of 0.75% sales tax funds currently authorized for the repayment of Riverside Parkway debt service to fund approximately \$50-60 million of transportation projects. This option would require no new taxes and would continue the City's current track record of using TABOR excess funds to support transportation infrastructure.

The City currently pays \$3.8 million annually for debt service on the Riverside Parkway which matures in 2024. The City's TABOR excess is projected to range from \$500,000 to \$1 million each year. Projection of the TABOR excess is based on several assumptions including sales tax growth, property tax values, the Denver, Aurora, Lakewood consumer price index (CPI), and local growth rate. Changes in these assumptions will change the excess projection.

The City currently has authorization from voters to use the excess for the improvement of existing street infrastructure through 2022. In order to fund transportation capacity expansion projects within the existing revenues, with no new taxes, the City would need to get voter authorization for the use of TABOR excess for roadway expansion and the for the issuance of debt. The City could service annual debt of up to \$52 million with these existing resources which would fund the widening of 24 Road (\$8 million), the construction of F ½ Road Parkway from Market Street to Patterson Road (\$10 million), the Riverside Parkway and Redlands Parkway Interchange improvements and trail connection between the Riverfront Trail and Canyon View Park (\$6.5 million), Patterson Road intersection improvements (\$10 million), D Road from 29 Road to 32 Road (\$13.1 million), and 26 ½ Road reconstruction (\$13 million).

Next Steps – If City Council decides to move forward with a November question, then time is of the essence. If the City does not move forward this fall, then the next opportunity would be in the fall of 2020, or the City's next municipal election, which is in the spring of 2021. Going forward with a question in the fall of 2020 is not preferred due to the national election crowding the ballot.

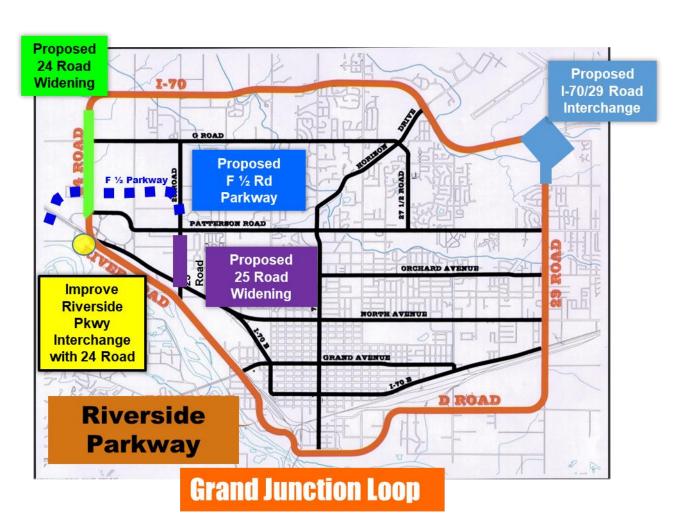
Transportation – Roadway Expansion

- Ability to move around our community is important measure of any community's quality of life.
- Good transportation system = good economic development
- Population is continuing to increase and housing demand increasing urgency and congestion on our roads slowing down the entire community.
- Advanced planning required for expansion of major transportation corridors, the Loop, and I-70 interchange as well as transforming many rural "farm" roads into complete urban streets.



Roadway Expansion Projects

- Regional: Grand Junction Loop with 29 Road &
 I-70 Interchange estimated costs = \$78 million
 - 29 Road & I-70 Interchange
 - **\$30 m** (City share)
 - Riverside Pkwy & 24 Road Interchange = \$20 m
 - Widening of 24 Road = \$10 m
 - Creating F ½ Road Pkwy = \$10 m
 - Widening 25 Road = **\$8 m**
- Backbone: Projects estimated costs = \$106 m
 - Projects increasing capacity for neighborhoods and improving mobility.
- Total estimated cost of all expansion projects =
 \$184 million





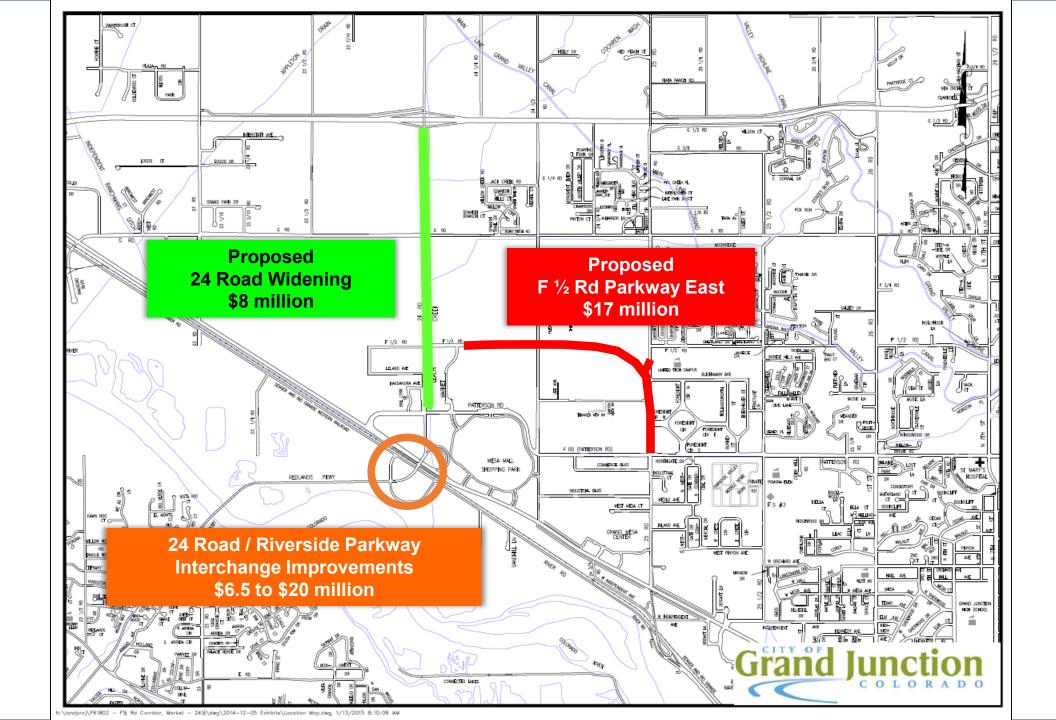
Four Approaches

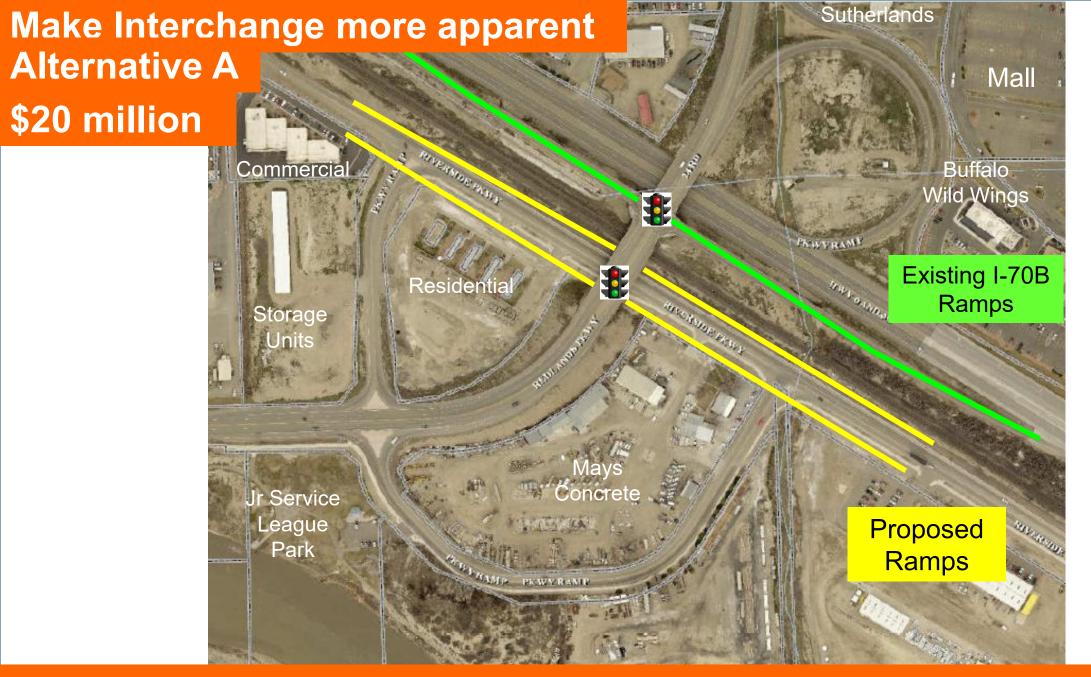
- New Revenue: ¼ Sales Tax dedicated towards roads \$4.3m/yr Spring 2019
- Existing ¾ cent sales tax: After Riverside Pkwy debt paid off \$3.8m/yr
- Update Transportation Impact Fee: Currently \$1.5m/yr
- Use TABOR excess: Repurpose after 2022 to transportation capacity \$0.5m to \$1.0m/yr



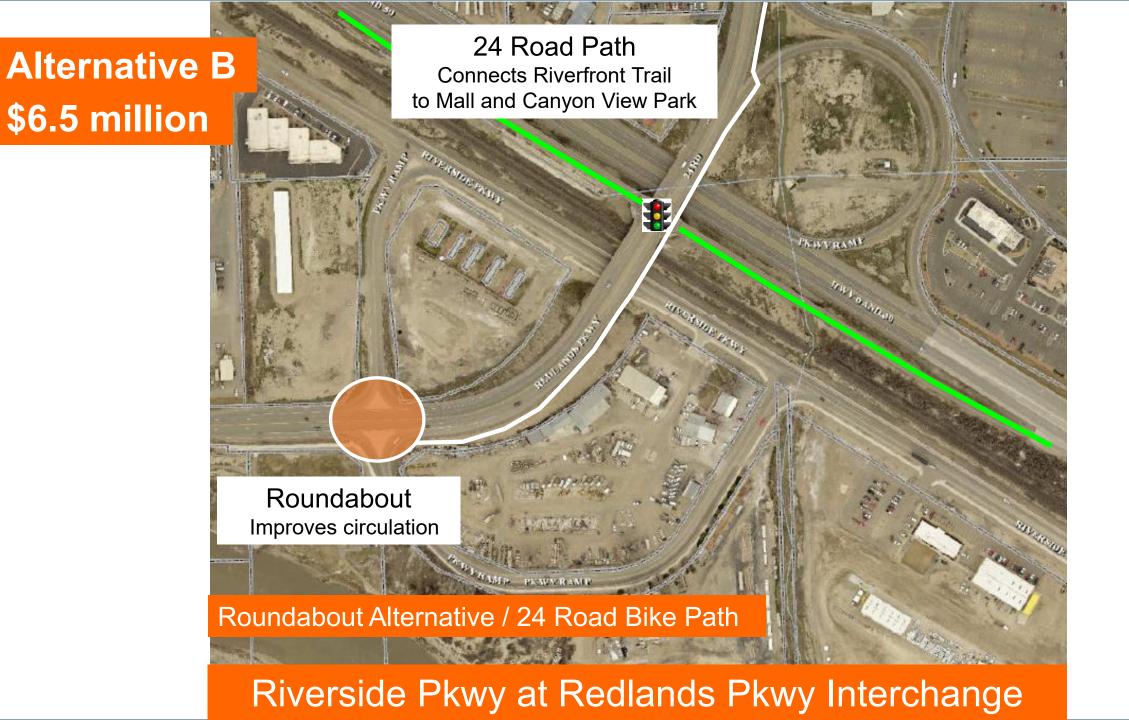
