I, Tina M. Peters, the County Clerk of Mesa County, Colorado (the "County"), hereby certify that:

1. On Tuesday, November 3, 2020, I conducted a general election (the "Election") in the County in full compliance with all applicable provisions of the Uniform Election Code of 1992 (the "Election Code"). The Election was conducted as a mail ballot election pursuant to the Election Code. A copy of the County's election ballot plan filed with and approved by the Secretary of State is attached hereto as Exhibit A.

2. City of Grand Junction (the "City"), located in Mesa County in the State of Colorado, on or before September 4, 2020, certified to me the ballot issues which are set forth in the sample of the ballot/page used for the Election, a true and correct copy of which is attached hereto as Exhibit B.

3. On or before October 2, 2020, I mailed or caused to be mailed to each address of one or more active registered electors of the City who do not reside within the City, the notice of election in the form attached hereto as Exhibit C which is required by Article X, Section 20(3)(b) of the Colorado Constitution.

4. Not less than twenty days prior to the Election, on or before October 14, 2020, I published or caused to be published a notice of election in the form attached hereto as Exhibit D at least one time in The Daily Sentinel, a newspaper of general circulation in the District. A copy of the Affidavit of Publication is attached hereto as Exhibit E.

5. Voting service and polling centers were open for delivery of mail ballots and receipt of replacement ballots from October 19, 2020 through Election Day.

6. UOCAVA ballots were mailed to all active registered UOCAVA electors beginning Friday, September 18, 2020 and all other mail ballot packets were mailed daily beginning Friday, October 9, 2020 through Friday, October 26, 2020.

7. Absentee voting was permitted for the Election substantially in the manner provided by the Election Code.

8. The results of the Election were duly canvassed according to law on November 23, 2020. Attached hereto as **Exhibit F** is a true and correct copy of the official abstract of votes cast at the Election.

9. As of the date hereof, no recount of the results has been initiated nor do I believe there is any basis for a recount.

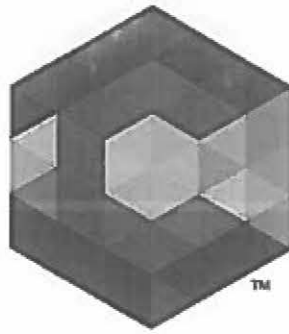

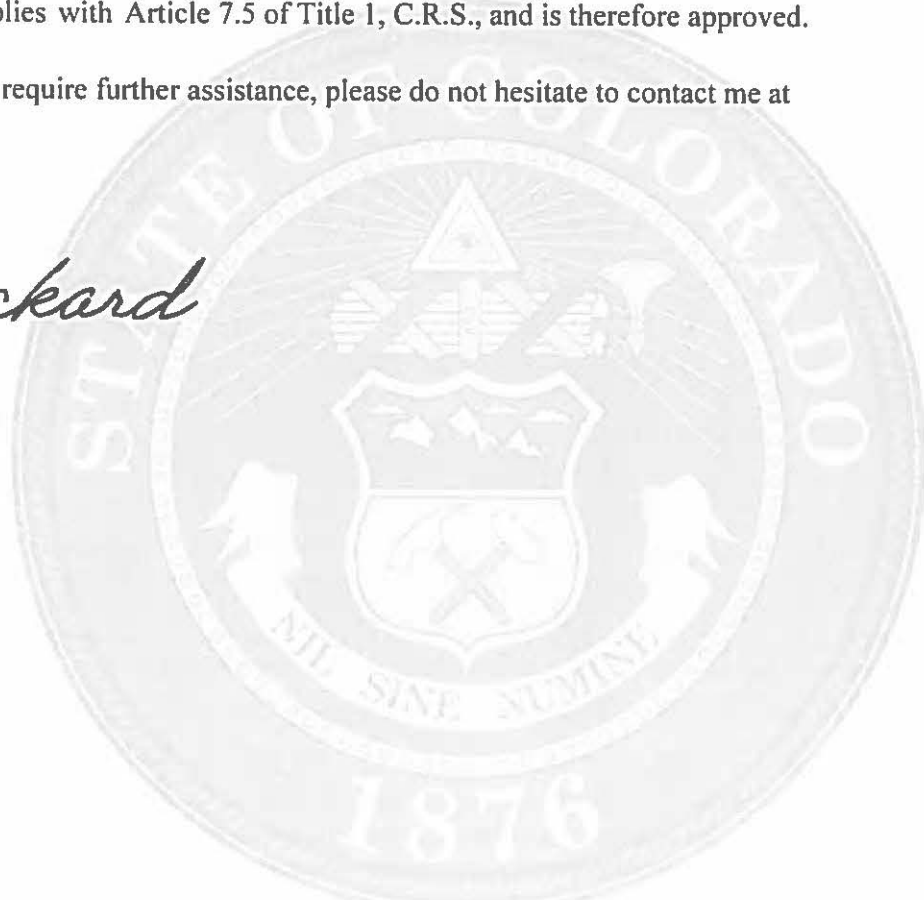

 - The ability for electors to obtain issuance of original or replacement mail ballot packets;
 - The ability for voters to securely drop off or return voted mail ballot packets;
 - The ability for individuals to obtain issuance of and cast provisional ballots;
 - A sufficient physical inventory of, or equipment enabling voters and election judges to mark or print on demand, in-person and mail ballots of all styles that can be tabulated by the voting system without duplication;
 - A sufficient inventory of mail ballot packets (outgoing and return envelopes, secrecy sleeves, voter instructions);
 - Voting booths enabling electors to mark electronic and paper in-person and mail ballots in private; and
 - Facilities and equipment that comply with applicable accessibility requirements of federal and state law, including accessible voting devices (direct recording electronic or ballot marking devices)

- At each polling location, the County will provide the ability for an eligible elector who does not reside in the county to obtain issuance of and cast a statewide mail ballot in accordance with the Secretary of State's statewide mail ballot procedure [Section 1-7-110(5), C.R.S.]

6. Drop box locations [Section 1-5-102.9(5), C.R.S.]

8. Ballot delivery and processing

- If the County receives a ballot for another County, the County will apply a date stamp and forward the ballot to the correct County.
- The County will issue replacement ballots according to section 1-7.5-107(3)(d), C.R.S.
- The County will follow section 1-7.5-107.3, C.R.S. and Election Rule 7.8 when conducting signature verification.

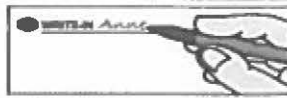

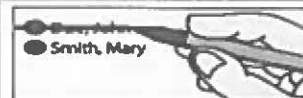

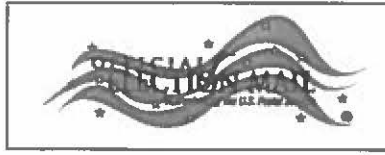

Background: The City of Grand Junction has asked city voters on several occasions to keep money collected above the TABOR cap to be used on variety of transportation needs including the Riverside Parkway, to resurface existing roadways and most recently in 2019 to fund a list of needed projects that improve and build local capacity on streets and roads. So, as of now all funds collected above the TABOR Cap for the next 15 years are earmarked for transportation improvements and retiring the debt associated with those projects.

The Problem: The 2020 pandemic has impacted everyone, including local governments and their sales tax collections. Due to formulas embedded in TABOR, the City of Grand Junction is subject to what is known as the ratchet-down effect. What this means is that if revenues fall in a particular year (as they most certainly will in 2020) the base amount upon which the TABOR calculation for what a jurisdiction is allowed to retain in tax revenue also falls. Summary of Written Comments FOR Ballot Issue No. 7A:

Funding is needed so that the River District can continue protecting water supplies for the farmers and ranchers that put food on our tables. The District will use this funding to protect drinking water supplies on the Western Slope. The District has clearly demonstrated the need for new revenues to protect West Slope water and keep our water on the Western Slope. The District's mill levy is consistently one of the lowest levies on the West Slope. 7A is a modest increase of less than 1/4 of a single mill. The District developed a robust fiscal implementation plan that explains exactly how these revenues would be spent. Without additional resources, the District will be forced to reduce its workforce even more, and this will jeopardize its ability to protect the West Slope's water security. The District is accountable to taxpayers and undergoes regular independent audits to ensure that taxpayer dollars are spent wisely. The District's Board members are appointed directly by County Commissioners in each of the 15 counties within the District, so every county has a say guiding the work of the River District.

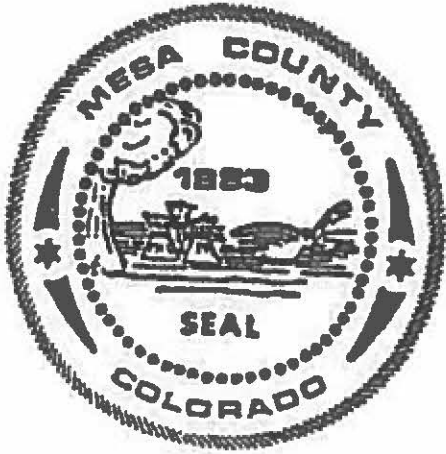

My role as a water resources engineer has provided me with the opportunity to really understand the importance of investing more in the protection of West Slope water and agricultural, industrial, municipal, and environmental/recreational users. The River District's mission is to protect these resources and the challenges in front of us with changing climate, hydrology, and water quality only emphasize the critical nature of your role.

This effort is non-partisan and enjoys broad support from conservative and progressive communities -- agricultural associations, conservation organizations and chambers of commerce have all come together to support and to protect West Slope water. The increase in property taxes is very small but will go a long way towards protecting West Slope water and keeping our water on the Western Slope. The Colorado River District is accountable to taxpayers and has created internal safeguards within a Fiscal Implementation plan to describe exactly how the money will be spent. It is good that this measure does not include a sunset provision because the need for protecting West Slope water will not go away. Front Range cities are buying up water rights and drying up productive farmland on the West Slope - some of which has been in families for generations. The Colorado River District needs the resources to protect our water, keep local food production, and preserve healthy rivers that contribute to our quality of life and outdoor lifestyle. I support this because it would mean only \$1.90 per year for each \$100,000 in home value per year. That is a very modest amount.

Summary of Written Comments AGAINST Ballot Issue No. 7A:

Unlike most other districts with taxing authority, the River District is an appointed, not an elected board and does not have direct accountability to the taxpayers. The increase in mill levy does not have a sunset date and does not require the board to come back to the voters to prove they've used the money wisely in order to reauthorize the tax. There is no clear list of projects that this money will be used for. The River District refers to a Fiscal Implementation Plan but refused to bind the tax increase to this plan. As taxpayers, we don't have assurance that they will use the money as they say, and a future board could change the plan. The mill levy is a significant increase rather than something more incremental. The language of the measure is noble in its ambition but vague in its application. Please vote 'NO' on Ballot issue 7A.



Texas officer charged in fatal store shooting

A white police officer has been charged with murder in the fatal shooting of a Black man following a reported disturbance at a convenience store in a small East Texas town, on-Officer said.

Jonathan Price was walking away from White City Police Officer James Lucas on Tuesday night when Lucas opened fire, killing Price, the Texas Rangers said in a statement released by the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Lucas' attorney, John Bicker, said in a statement that the officer "was discharged his weapon in accordance with

Texas law when he was confronted with an aggressive individual who was attempting to take his store gun. Lucas, 33, remained jailed on Tuesday. Jail records show he was out on \$5 million.

Lucas had been with the White City Police Department for a little less than six months and was shooting on his own, according to records from the

Texas Commission on Law Enforcement. His prior law enforcement experience had been working as a jailer with the Hunt County Sheriff's Office for about five months.

Members of the community came together Monday evening for a vigil to honor Price and demand justice. Civil rights attorney Lee Merritt said it was a diverse group of people who gathered.

"I know that people's voices are so powerful," Merritt said Tuesday. "Anytime that communities come up like we've seen all over the country, things actually begin to change."

Merritt said Price's family was relieved to hear that Lucas

was arrested Monday night but said "that arrest should've taken place two days ago." He said it was a relatively quiet arrest for a killing by an officer.

Following the shooting Saturday night in White City, city officials only confirmed that an officer-fired gunshot had occurred and the officer had been placed on administrative leave pending an investigation by the Texas Rangers. It wasn't until Monday night that the Texas Rangers released a statement that provided more details and that Lucas had been charged.

According to the Texas Rangers' statement, Lucas responded to a disturbance and

on Saturday night following a report of a possible fight. He encountered Price, 31, who was reportedly involved in the disturbance, and Price "reacted to a non-threatening posture and began walking away," the Texas Rangers said.

Lucas used a stun gun before shooting Price, who was taken to a hospital and died, the statement said.

Officials haven't released any details about the disturbance but family and friends of Price said the one-time college football player was interacting in a domestic disturbance.

"When police arrived, I'm told, he raised his hands and attempted to explain what was going

on," Merritt said in a Facebook post.

Bicker said Price "did not appear to be an unruly, violent person" whom Lucas arrested at the store.

"Officer Lucas tried to detain Mr. Price and he resisted. After Mr. Price refused repeated instructions and physically resisted, Officer Lucas employed his (stun) gun and attempted to gain Mr. Price's compliance. Mr. Price refused the effects of the (stun) gun and attempted to take it away from Officer Lucas," Bicker said.

Price's relatives and friends said Price, a White City employee, was a figure well-known in the close-knit community.

FDA sets vaccine rules opposed by White House

WASHINGTON — The Food and Drug Administration released updated safety standards Tuesday for makers of COVID-19 vaccines. The move is opposed by the White House in part because it leaves the way for requirements that are likely to be challenged in court.

Former FDA officials have warned that public perception that a vaccine was being rushed could hurt its success.

In the new guidelines posted on its website, the FDA said vaccine makers should follow strict protocols for at least two months to rule out any major side effects before seeking emergency approval. That standard had been a sticking point between the FDA and White House officials, who said it would delay the availability of COVID-19 vaccines.

President Donald Trump has repeatedly insisted a vaccine could be authorized before Nov. 3, even though top government scientists working on the effort have said that timeline is very unlikely. On Monday Trump said vaccines are coming "imminently" in a video.

Former FDA officials have warned that public perception that a vaccine was being rushed could hurt its success.

A similar administration official confirmed Monday that the White House had blocked FDA's plan to formally publish the safety guidelines based on the two-month date requirement. Officials said they were "in contact" with people scrambling for provisions under existing laws.

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Cat 4 hurricane bears down on Yucatan

CANCUN, Mexico — Hurricane Delta rapidly intensified into a dangerous Category 4 storm with 140 mph winds Tuesday night facing a course to hammer southeastern Mexico and then continue on to the U.S. Gulf Coast later in the week.

The worst of the hurricane impact was expected along the northeastern coastlines tip of Mexico's Yucatan Peninsula, where hurricanes are rare. Wind gusts were expected Tuesday night and reached early today.

From Tulum to Cancun, tourists reported winds. The storm still tracked by the remnants of Tropical Storm Omega could bear the brunt of the storm.

In Cancun, long lines stretched from supermarkets, banks, jewelry and gun stores as people scrambled for provisions under existing laws.

Delta warned that residents should have several days of water and food on hand. Most power lines up at public ranges in fell their own out of the way.

Maths evacuated thousands of tourists and residents from coastal areas near to Riviera Maya. Some 100 soldiers were sent to Cancun ahead.
