

Describe Event: Young children ages 5-13 are invited to learn various art techniques from different local artists. The kids spend time learning about the technique before trying it on their own. Depending on the day, a few different local artists are able to come in and demonstrate their skills. The kids are able to interact with each other as well as the instructor.

Strengths of Event: It was great that the Art Center was still able to host this event. I think finding safe ways to get kids outside and interacting with each other is more important than ever.

I really like the care taken to keep the kids and staff safe. Rachel admitted that she says late to wipe down all the tools and tables the kids are using. The participation was cut off at 12 to maximize social distancing. Tables were set up in the auditorium and kids were only sitting at the ends (2 kids per table).

The diversity of art exposure is impressive. I like how they really try to bring in different artists to showcase the diversity of the word "art." Just in the day I was visiting, the kids made potpourri sachets, made chalk drawings, and I think Racheal was going to teach alcohol ink.

It's always difficult to know how the kids are affected, but they all seemed to be having fun and they were all participating.

Weaknesses of Event: It was sad to see the attendance so low. Lee told me that attendance was less than half of normal. Normal holiday classes are typically 20-30 kids. His feeling was that half of parents are scared of COVID exposure and the other half are against wearing masks.

Rachel admitted to me that she feels a lot of parents view the camps as cheap babysitting. While we need to give some slack to the Art Center for dealing with pandemic rules, I felt the engagement can be even greater. On some level, the kids

were just given prompts and set loose and that often just feels like busy work set to pass the time.

This pandemic has very much tested the limits of adaptation and I feel they were essentially trying to run a camp without any modifications aside from meeting safety regulations.

Suggestions for Improvement: This pandemic has been a true test of who can adapt to drastic change. I feel this was a prime opportunity for the Art Center to take a leap into digital art.

While I do feel it's important to give the kids a chance to socialize outside of their homes, they didn't need to run these camps in-person at all. Digital art such as graphic design, photo editing, and even web development have practical applications as well as easy adaptability for teaching online.

In this age of webinars and zoom meetings, I feel the Art Center missed out on a chance to reach a broader audience (and possibly make more revenue) by going online.

GJCOAC Logo usage: There wasn't a lot of advertising to begin with. Most of the outreach was done with an email to people already on their mailing list. Our logo was used on the brochure and placed on their website page with the camps. The flier was also posted on their Facebook page.
