
I, Brandi L Bantz, the Designated Election Official of Mesa County, Colorado (the "Designated Election Official"), hereby certify that:

1. On Tuesday, November 8, 2022, I conducted a general election (the "Election") in the County in full compliance with all applicable provisions of the Uniform Election Code of 1992 (the "Election Code"). The Election was conducted as a mail ballot election pursuant to the Election Code.
2. City of Grand Junction (the "City"), located in Mesa County, Colorado, on or before September 9, 2022, certified to me the ballot issues which are set forth in the sample of the ballot/page used for the Election, a true and correct copy of which is attached hereto as **Exhibit A**.
3. On or before October 7, 2022, I mailed or caused to be mailed to each address of one or more active registered electors of the City, the notice of election in the form attached hereto as **Exhibit B** which is required by Article X, Section 20(3)(b) of the Colorado Constitution.
4. Not less than twenty days prior to the Election, on or before October 19, 2022, I published or caused to be published a notice of election in the form attached hereto as **Exhibit C** at least one time in The Daily Sentinel, a newspaper of general circulation in the City. A copy of the Affidavit of Publication is attached hereto as **Exhibit D**.
5. Voting service and polling centers were open for delivery of mail ballots and receipt of replacement ballots from October 24, 2022 through Election Day.
6. UOCAVA ballots were mailed to all active registered UOCAVA electors beginning Friday, September 23, 2022 and all other mail ballot packets were mailed daily beginning Monday, October 17, 2022 through Monday, October 31, 2022.
7. Absentee voting was permitted for the Election substantially in the manner provided by the Election Code.
8. The results of the Election were duly canvassed according to law on November 29, 2022. Attached hereto as **Exhibit E** is a true and correct copy of the official abstract of votes cast at the Election.

9. As of the date hereof, no recount of the results has been initiated nor do I believe there is any basis for a recount.

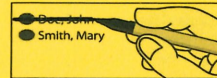


MESA COUNTY WITH HD 54 AND CITY OF GJ

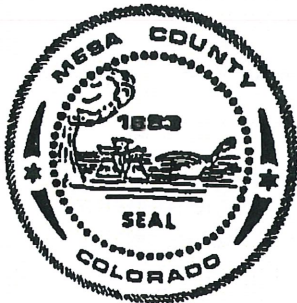

Smashing success: NASA's asteroid strike results in big nudge

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. — A spacecraft that plowed into a small, harmless asteroid millions of miles away succeeded in shifting its orbit, NASA said Tuesday in announcing the results of its save-the-world test.

The space agency attempted the first test of its kind two weeks ago to see if in the future a killer rock could be nudged out of Earth's way.

The Dart spacecraft carved a crater into the asteroid Dimorphos on Sept. 26, hurling debris into space and creat-

ing a cometlike trail of dust and rubble stretching several thousand miles. It took days of telescope observations to determine how much the impact altered the path of the 525-foot asteroid around its companion, a much bigger space rock.

Before the impact, the moonlet took 11 hours and 55 minutes to circle its parent asteroid. Scientists had hoped to shave off 10 minutes but NASA Administrator Bill Nelson said the impact altered the asteroid's orbit by about 32 minutes.

"This mission shows that NASA is trying to be ready for whatever

the universe throws at us," Nelson said during a briefing at NASA headquarters in Washington.

Neither asteroid posed a threat to Earth — and still don't as they continue their journey around the sun. That's why scientists picked the pair for the world's first attempt to alter the position of a celestial body.

Launched last year, the vending machine-size Dart — short for Double Asteroid Redirection Test — was destroyed when it slammed into the asteroid 7 million miles away at 14,000 mph.

The test cost \$325 million.

Outrage erupts at LA Council meeting over racist remarks

LOS ANGELES — A raucous crowd of protesters packed the Los Angeles City Council chamber Tuesday, calling for the resignation of three members involved in a closed-door meeting in which racist language was used to describe the colleagues — and even one councilmember's toddler son — as they plotted to safeguard Latino political strength in council districts.

The start of the meeting was delayed as protesters shouted for Councilmen Kevin de Leon and Gill Cedillo to leave the room, while police officers scurried at the edge of the crowd, waving futilely for protesters to sit down.

Former Council president Nury Martinez, a Democrat, stepped down

from the job and apologized Monday, saying she was ashamed of her racially offensive language in the year-old recording.

Martinez, however, did not resign her council seat. She announced Tuesday that "I need to take a leave of absence and take some time to have an honest and heartfelt conversation with my family, my constituents, and community leaders."

She did not appear at the meeting, where protesters shouted, "Hey hey, ho ho, Nury Martinez, has got to go! What do we want? Justice! When do we want it? Now!"

Martinez's recorded remarks, which included mocking the Black son of a white councilman, came during a private discussion with de Leon, Cedillo and a Latino labor leader about protecting their political power during the

redrawing of council district boundaries, known as redistricting. The once-a-decade process can pit one group against another to gain political advantage in future elections.

The white councilman, Mike Bonin, said he was deeply wounded by the remarks and lamented the city was in international headlines spotlighting the racist remarks. "I'm sickened by it," he said, calling again for their resignations.

Blacks and Latinos often build alliances in politics, but tension and rivalries among groups separated by race, geography, partisanship or religion have a long history in Los Angeles and, indeed, the country. The friction can cross into housing, education and jobs — even prisons — as well as the spoils of political power.
