Call to Order/Announcements: Athena calls meeting to order at 5:33.

Meeting Minutes

1. December Minutes

Diana moves to approve December minutes with spelling corrections. Julia seconds, unanimous approval.

Action Items

1. Active Traffic Counts and Bike Month

Diana shared that there used to be a National Day for Bike and Pedestrian Counts. Mike said he could join if it's not too late in the month. Diana recommended not publishing official dates in Ride Magazine.

Committee aligned on May 3, 6, and 8 for counts. Steve moves to approve Diana and Brooke for subcommittee and dates. Kristen seconds, unanimous approval.

2. Walk Audit

Carissa recommended three dates/times for a February walk audit. Julia moves to schedule walk audit for 2/12 and reschedule the February meeting for 2/26. Brooke seconds, unanimous approval.

3. Infrastructure Priorities

Owen and Henry presented the new maps and form idea. Committee discussed workshopping in March for voting in April.

Jason recommended including a reference to the High Injury Network on the discussion.

Steve and Diana proposed including whether a given project has relevance for mobility impaired travelers. Diana moves to schedule a special workshop on March 26 to discuss and filter new suggestions. Brooke seconds, unanimous approval.

4. 4th & 5th Streets Feedback

Henry and Trent shared city plans for pilot changes and idea for a subcommittee to be formed to express an opinion from the Committee. Julia recommended Athena draft a letter after hearing the opinions of committee members.

Steve and Kristen expressed interest in serving on a subcommittee.

Julia moves to have a workshop on 1/29 to discuss 4th and 5th Street. Kristen seconded, unanimous approval.

Discussion Items

1. Annual Report

Henry reminded the committee to review and submit any suggestions on the Annual Report (see email). Request to send any input by end of month.

2. Wayfinding Map 2025 Update

Owen shared the draft map update and solicited some feedback from the Committee. The Committee was aligned that 1st Street could be classified as "comfortable." There was discussion on the symbology and layout of the routes. Mike expressed interest in revisiting the routes themselves.

Updates

1. Engineering Update

Trent shared updates on Monument Trail, anticipated to be completed by Q2. Horizon/G Road roundabout will be out for bid shortly. North Avenue ETC sidewalk construction is under design, for CDOT review in March. Crosby Avenue Utility phase is coming shortly. D ½ Road Utilities are under design for Complete Streets between 29 and 30 Roads. 7th Street will be on Council Workshop on 2/3. Mobility Hub – CDOT is buying the land west of 2nd Street on Ute & Pitkin. Four Canyons Parkway is open from 24 to 24 ½ Roads. The City and CDOT are working on designing a trail widening for the Broadway Bridge.

2. Shared Micromobility Update

Henry presented slides from the Q4 and 2024 reports and shared the intention to go to Council in February for some recommended code changes to accommodate the transition to an enduring permitting process.

Subject: Support for Broadway Bridge Trail

Revitalizing Main Streets Grant Application

To Whom It May Concern,

On behalf of Grand Junction's Urban Trails Committee, we are pleased to express support for the broadening of the Broadway Bridge Trail. This project was first identified as a priority by the Urban Trails Committee in 2020. The Broadway/C340 bridge is the only connection from Downtown Grand Junction to the residential, commercial, and recreational areas on the south Redlands. Today, the pathway is squeezed narrowly between a railing with a large gap and a tall concrete barrier. As a result, two-way traffic is not possible across the bridge, outside of a motor vehicle. This is especially troublesome given the high speed of motor vehicle traffic, precluding all but the most confident bicycle riders from using the travel lane or shoulder for westbound travel, and there is no shoulder or pathway designated for eastbound travel outside of a motor vehicle. With key destinations on the Redlands such as Safeway, the Lunch Loops, the Colorado National Monument, and significant new and existing residential developments, and all of the services and employment in downtown, the Broadway Bridge Trail is a critical connection. This is acknowledged in Grand Junction's 2023 Pedestrian Bicycle Plan, which ranks Broadway "High Priority" for sidewalk users and cyclists alike.

As an advisory committee to Grand Junction's City Council, the Urban Trails Committee is tasked with guiding elected officials and City Staff on programming, policy, and physical infrastructure to ensure our entire community has access to safe, comfortable, and right-sized transportation options to meet their daily needs. The Committee believes enhancing the Broadway Bridge Trail will allow more of the traveling public to consider walking, cycling, or rolling when crossing the Colorado River. We hope that CDOT will consider this project for Revitalizing Main Streets grant funds.
