Minutes

Call to Order/Announcements:

Athena called the meeting to order at 5:34 PM. The meeting started with introductions for the benefit of incoming members.

Meeting Minutes

1. April Minutes

Diana moves to approve slightly updated April minutes, as shown. Kristen seconds, unanimous approval.

Action Items

1. Infrastructure Priority Ranking

Henry shared the ratings from UTC and mentioned the history of 7th Street. Diana shared that the curves at Monument Trail don't meet CDOT design guidelines and that signage may help as a low-cost safety improvement.

Kristen moves to accept the list as rated. Steve seconds, unanimous approval.

Diana moves to add North 7th to the bottom of the list. Kirsten seconds, unanimous approval.

Discussion Items

1. Leach Creek Trail Study

Ren from CU Denver MURP called in to share a presentation about the Leach Creek Trail Concept Study. Kristen mentioned that the Redlands Parkway crossing has some elegance/simplicity over existing concepts of building new structures. Steve asked about the south of G Road section and whether there are portions up for development. Trent shared that it is mostly dedicated as Open Space. Mike asked about the I-70 crossing and Trent shared some details about the existing Leach Creek culverts and existing trail developments.

2. Annual Roadmap

Henry shared recommendations on the Annual Roadmap. The Committee asked for time to review the recommendations with a plan to discuss in the June meeting.

Updates

1. 4th & 5th Streets Complete Streets Pilot

Staff shared an update based on the direction from Council to end the Complete Streets pilot. UTC asked about the opportunity for nuance between reverting the business district only versus the residential district. Staff shared that this could be technically feasible but is not the direction received. UTC asked if there is an opportunity for Council to change their minds. Staff shared that there is an opportunity for public comment at next Wednesday's public hearing. Staff shared that there is still Council interest in slower speeds and safer conditions, but not necessarily for accommodating cyclists on 4th & 5th. The committee asked if stop signs or roundabouts may be options. Staff shared that stop signs are not allowed to be used for traffic calming per MUTCD.

Timing will be mid-/late-June reversion.

Urban Trails Committee – Minutes – May 14, 2025 – Regular Meeting

Diana moves for the UTC to write a letter to Council requesting they reconsider and allow pilot 2.0 to continue until the study comes to its conclusion before determining whether it should be reverted, since it is more fiscal responsible to complete the existing project and determine solutions that work for all. Brooke seconds, 7 approve, 1 opposed. Committee members will share any letter discussion items to Diana and Brooke ASAP for them to craft a letter for Staff to route to City Council.

2. Bike Month & Pedestrian/Bicycle Counts

Diana shared about bike counts. A very successful year; we did not need to ask Dave and Lenore to volunteer last minute. 10 new volunteers through new channels.

Carissa shared 5/16 is BTWD with free breakfast and 5/20 chainbreaking ride with a group ride from City Hall at 3:50 PM.

Subject: Support for the Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A) Implementation Program for the City of Grand Junction

To Whom it may Concern,

On behalf of Grand Junction's Urban Trails Committee (UTC), we are pleased to express our support for the City of Grand Junction in its application to the U.S. Department of Transportation for funding to implement components of the Mesa County Safety Action Plan within city limits. Informed by the recently adopted regional Safety Action Plan and aligned with the goals of the federal Safe Streets & Roads for All (SS4A) program, the proposed implementation actions will strengthen our transportation network and help ensure that safe transportation options are available for all users of our street and road network.

As an advisory committee to City Council, the Urban Trails Committee is proud to provide guidance to elected officials and City Staff on programming, policy, and physical infrastructure to ensure our entire community has access to safe and accommodating transportation options to meet their daily needs. We are excited to support the comprehensive infrastructure and education efforts proposed to be implemented with support from the U.S. Department of Transportation and local matching fundings.

Importantly, ongoing advancement of the North Avenue Enhanced Transportation Corridor (ETC) is a major priority for Grand Junction and has been identified as such by the UTC since at least 2017. ETC implementation, including completing gaps in the sidewalk network and installing transit infrastructure, has consistently ranked as a top-5 priority. Given North Avenue's status as US-6, adjacency to major regional employers, commercial districts, schools, and services, filling missing sidewalk gaps supports the safety of all travelers in the community by allowing vulnerable road users space to travel out of the way of motor vehicles.

Beyond infrastructure, the UTC wholeheartedly supports the development of new educational programming and professional collaborating opportunities to advance strategies adopted in the regional Safety Action Plan. Providing youth training opportunities is well-understood to increase safety on our transportation network. Providing a venue for professionals to collaborate and present on advancements in their understanding of safety will benefit not just the city of Grand Junction, but all travelers in and through the region.


Mesa County Regional Transportation Planning Office Overview








Grand Valley Metropolitan Planning Organization (GVMPO)

- 141,500 residents (2020)
- 128 square miles

Areas Covered

- Unincorporated Mesa County
- City of Grand Junction
- City of Fruita
- Town of Palisade



Role of the MPO

- Federally mandated and federally-funded transportation policy-making organization.
- Mandated by Federal-Aid Highway Act of 1962
- Required if seeking federal funds in urbanized areas (UZAs) with populations >50,000
- >400 MPOs in the US
- Ensures comprehensive, continuous and cooperative planning



2050 Regional Transportation Plan (Approved April 2025)

What is a Regional Transportation Plan?

It is a long-range vision for Grand Valley's transportation system to ensure that we are planning and investing in projects and strategies that meet the needs of the people and the community over the next 25 years.



2050 Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) Vision

Communities in the Grand Valley will be connected through a safe and accessible transportation system that is designed, built, and maintained for users of all ages, and abilities who drive, walk, bike, roll, take transit, deliver freight, or travel by other modes.



Greenhouse Gas Emission Reductions


- Greenhouse Gas Emission reductions were achieved by:
 - Improvements in multimodal system:
 - Completed: 21.75 miles
 - In design: 13 miles
 - Under construction: 4.15 miles
 - Changes in land-use due to local planning documents, local government investment in infrastructure, incentives, and affordable housing projects have resulted in-fill development and higher density multi-family homes.
 - Increase in work from home rates
 - Increase in e-bike and e-scooter usage


Goals, Objectives and Actions Goal Areas

Grand Valley Transit Vision Statement




Feedback from the Public


- Brought up frequently even when transit was not explicitly asked about.

 and concentrating service.













Expansion Route Concept Presented to Public












GVT is Fare-Free All Summer!!!
