### Parks Improvement Advisory Board August 17, 2011

#### Item 1: Meeting Called to Order by Bruce Hill at 11:36 a.m.

Bruce Hill introduced Walt Bergman, who will be serving as the "alternate" member for JUCO. Welcome Walt!

#### **Item 2: Approve Minutes**

Lena Elliott moved to approve the June 28, 2011 Parks Improvement Advisory Board minutes. Harry Butler seconded.

Motion adopted by the Parks Improvement Advisory Board: Yes 5 No 0

#### **Item 3: Stadium Naming Process**

Bruce Hill expressed the desire for the board to develop a naming process, in order to provide a standard system for reviewing the recommendations for naming facilities after individuals who have participated in the stadium's development. The possibility of naming the stadium tower at Lincoln Park was also discussed, especially due to the strong visual effect on North Avenue/surrounding area that the new building will have. The Reford Theobold press box was briefly discussed, with Bruce Hill stating City Council has been presented with the option of a name tag being installed in the elevator that reads "Reford Theobold Press Box Level"; a plaque would also be hung on that level with a picture of Mr. Theobold and his years of service. Jay Valentine discussed the stipulations regarding the 501c3 bond, which prohibits the City from selling naming rights, as it must be for private use only. The City chose to go with the 501c3 bond due to the lower interest rates. Discussion ensued regarding it being a standard practice to name facilities. It was suggested the tower be named "JUCO Tower", which would not be in violation of the bond requirements, as JUCO is a 501c3 organization. The board agreed they need to establish a naming process as quickly as possible and present it to City Council for approval. Bruce Hill

requested staff develop a written plan for review at the October 4, 2011 Parks Improvement Advisory Board meeting.

#### **Item 4: Review Stadium Art**

Rob Schoeber presented the proposals for the 1% for the Arts program project at the new stadium. (See attached) Mr. Schoeber stated the Arts Commission sent out a request for proposals approximately two months ago, in which they received a total of 21 submissions from all across the country. The Arts Commission narrowed it down to four finalist based on numerous factors, including cost, size, durability, appropriateness for facility, etc. The Stadium Committee then met and reviewed the finalists further, determining that the "wrap" option would not work due to it only having a three year life expectancy. The Stadium Committee moved forward by narrowing it down to the artist who proposed the "climber", but asked him to provide some additional options for review. The two options the artist resubmitted were later presented in the City's online survey process requesting public comments. The survey results were overwhelmingly in support of the "catcher". Lena Elliott expressed this was the perfect opportunity for a historical wrap, similar to the one at the Denver Museum. The Board members expressed concern regarding the blank walls on the east and west sides of the stadium, deciding these walls would be a great place to hang banners. Discussion ensued, with the Board members stating they would prefer a more "obvious" sports figure and something that closer reflects what is going on in the facility. It was suggested the artist research the stick figures that are currently being used by the Olympics.

#### **Item 5: Financial Report**

Jay Valentine briefly reviewed the current financial report.

#### **Item 6: Executive Session**

Tom Kenyon moved to enter into an Executive session. Harry Butler seconded.

Motion adopted by the Parks Improvement Advisory Board: Yes 5 No 0

Executive session was adjourned at 12:55 p.m.

Craig Meis moved to support the City's request for a \$100,000 contribution towards the stadium project, which will be split into two annual payments of \$50,000. Lena Elliott seconded.

Motion adopted by the Parks Improvement Advisory Board: Yes 5 No 0

The Board requested staff draft a letter to the Mayor and City Council stating the Parks Improvement Advisory Board has unanimously approved the \$100,000 contribution at today's meeting, but strongly recommends the City attempt to negotiate a larger contribution from the baseball group, as well as request information regarding the economic impact of the contract. It was requested the letter also indicate the Board's concern regarding the need to preserve funding in order to furnish the new stadium.

#### **Item 7: Other Business**

The Board members discussed the need to develop a mission statement. Bruce Hill asked the Board members to bring some suggestions to the October meeting for further discussion.

Rob Schoeber reported City Council had recently agreed to a sole source authorization (Musco lighting) to relocate the light towers at the stadium. This project will result in "all" of the lights on both field being moved out of the spectator's line of sight and brought up to broadcast standards. Bruce Hill provided a brief update on the construction project, stating the construction is currently 12 days ahead of schedule and remains within budget.

The meeting was adjourned at 1:08 p.m. by acclamation.





1. The City of Grand Junction has had a '1% for the Arts' resolution in place since 1997. For the Suplizio Field/Stocker Stadium renovation project, two pieces of art are being considered for inclusion from an original pool of 21 pieces. The Grand Junction Commission on Arts and Culture narrowed it down to these two pieces and they want to hear from the community as to your favorite. The final product will be placed on the new stadium tower, on the south-facing side. The stainless steel sculpture, which is approximately forty feet high, will be mounted on the south side of the support tower for the new press facilities at the Suplizio Field/ Stocker Stadium.
