Administration

In order to update the signature card for the Commission's checking account, Stephanie requested a resolution be passed by the Commission approving the removal of the retiring co-chairmen, Brian Mahoney and Bill Ela and the addition of the new co-chairs, Paul

Nelson and Bill Prakken.

Additional presentations were made by Stephanie who gave Brian a stuffed goose named Lucy in honor of his undaunted optimism and his credo of always staying "loosey goosey". Jim Robb made a presentation of an original Watson Island artifacts, a Christmas tree that had been found on one of the organization's expeditionary raft trips. Bill Ela gave it to Jim when he retired from the Commission. It was decided that the tree should be made a permanent trophy and kept in the Riverfront office where the names of future Commission leaders could be added in recognition of their service as well as those who had gone before.

Entertainment

As soon as it was dark enough, Brian treated the group to the premier of a slide show prepared by a local volunteer, Richard Bolden. The tentative title, "The Birth of a Trail - Blue Heron II, Start to Finish", describes the content fairly accurately. Mr. Bolden photographed the development of the trail from the initial brush clearing done by the Bookcliff Middle School students led by former Commission member Brad Loucks to the staking of the trail alignment to the earth work to setting the forms for the concrete to the ribbon cutting to views of the finished trail.

Brian promised that he would continue to be available to present the Commission's slide shows to audiences either here in the valley or where ever there was a need.

QUESTIONS FOR INVOLVED ENTITIES

Organization Title

Grand Junction/Mesa County Riverfront Commission

Purpose/Mission Statement

- (a) To foster, for people of all ages, park, recreation, leisure time facilities and opportunities along the Colorado River and its tributaries within the City of Grand Junction, County of Mesa, State of Colorado, and areas surrounding or convenient thereto;
- (b) To reclaim the Colorado Riverfront and in so doing to develop the area to its maximum recreational potential, to preserve the wildlife and its habitat and to focus the progress as a source of community pride and economic revitalization for the entire Grand Valley in Mesa County, Colorado;
- (c) To promote the development of a network of bicycle/pedestrian trails, both off-road and on-road, that will connect residential and commercial areas to local parks, schools and the Riverfront Trail System.

Geographical Service Area.

The river basins of the Colorado and Gunnison Rivers in Mesa County.

Management and Operations Structure

Eleven member board appointed jointly by the Grand Junction City Council and the Mesa County Commissioners. Membership is voluntary and appointments are for three year terms which may be renewed. Two Co-Chairs provide leadership with the support of a part time staff person.

Financing Mechanisms

Funding for the operations and overhead of this organization comes from a grant from the City of Grand Junction and contributions from the Colorado Riverfront Foundation, Inc. which shares office space and staff support with the Commission.

Capital construction is funded by local government, state and federal grants, private foundation grants local fund raising

and individual contributions.

4. Major Planning and Construction Activities

- (a) The long-term goal of the Commission is to construct an east/west bicycle/pedestrian trail from one end of Mesa County to the other;
- (b) To build trail connecting the existing Watson Island Trail to Riverside Park;
- (c) To see the Orchard Mesa bicycle/pedestrian bridge completed connecting Orchard Mesa to the north side of the Colorado River and the Riverfront Trail System;
- (d) To protect the open space and foster trail development south of the city that will memorialize the historic Old Spanish Trail;
- (e) To encourage the marking of on-road bicycle routes that are both safe and suitable for non-motorized vehicular use;
- (g) To join by improved on-road and off-road trail networks the entire valley to the Colorado River corridor;
- (h) To acquire and see developed, as a part of the Colorado River Trails System, the Confluence Point site;
- (i) To see the old Climax Mill tailing site included in plans for local parks and recreation development.

5. Interaction with County/Municipal Government

There is a close working relationship with the City of Grand Junction Parks and Recreation Department. City emphasis on Community Development Department's participation in parks and recreation planning has diminished in the past few years, but we have a history of cooperation with city land use planners.

We have had development review privileges with the County for any property adjacent to the Colorado River for the purpose of requesting trail easements. The department head, Joe Crocker, has been supportive and encouraging of our efforts.

6. Interaction with Mesa County

A member of the County Commissioners serves as an ex-officio member of the Commission, but attendance has been sparse. There is contact and cooperation between Commission members and County staff, but mostly on an informal basis.

7. Perceived Role in County Land Use Planning

To encourage the concept that recreation and open space are critical components of land use planning and that they be included in the County's future planning efforts. As a County appointed entity we should be active in helping to shape Countywide development of non-motorized transportation routes and facilities.

8. Vision of Mesa County in 15 Years

Citizens will be able to travel the length and breadth of this valley on a trail system that will provide routes separated or at least shielded from automobile traffic. The schools, parks, homes and the rivers will all be accessible to the users of these trails.

9. Three Issues and Impacts

Recreation planning, in particular trails, must extend beyond the limits of the cities of Grand Junction and Fruita and should have the County's cooperation.

The County must take some financial responsibility for the construction and maintenance of recreational and trails facilities.

The consequence will be a decline in both the quality of life in the unincorporated suburban areas in Mesa County and the likelihood that the Riverfront Project will not realize its dream of a trail extending from the eastern boundary of Mesa County to the Utah border.

10. Participation in Implementation of Countywide Land Use Plan

The Commission should have had a seat on the original steering committee and it should definitely be represented on a County planning policy implementation committee.
