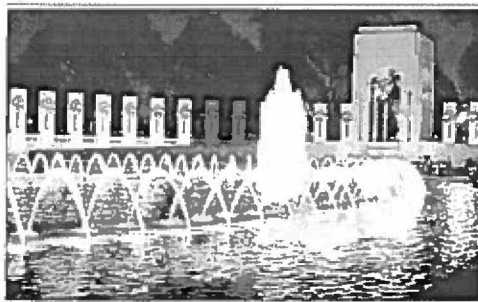

FLIGHT: Groups trying to raise at least \$50,000

 Whether said bills create needs over time and individuals to carry \$50,000 to \$100,000 by the mid of March to make the trip possible. He has spread the word in the community so they as many World War II veterans as possible apply for the five trips.
 "I don't estimate there are 200,000 World War II vets in the United States. I don't know how many of them are still alive and how many are still in the service," he said.
 "If I do know there, five several, Washington and at least 10 people already have agreed to go with the group trip at \$50,000 and the 11 veterans (and their families) will be able to go to the United States and visit with their families and see some of their sons and daughters of veterans, and apply to us to help to pay their own way."
 The trip will be a bit of a challenge, Washington said. You will travel and check into a U.S. area to visit a family and have dinner that night. Then Saturday they'll have breakfast before riding a luxury passenger on the Monarch World War II

Memorial, where the statues are likely they'll be visited by one of Colorado's legislators or John DeLo, or John McCain, who have served veterans in the past.

DRILLER: Other companies hesitate on Roan

 Warren Creek and Inert Production have returned back their drilling plans to the northeast Colorado's Frontier Basin, citing falling natural gas prices and other regulatory factors.
 The companies that have drilled holes for 100,000 oil rigs on the Roan (Denver) 13A

horizon, are not planning to immediately develop their assets.
 Steve Crowe, spokeswoman for Continental Petroleum Corp., said everything is to be the air in the basin.
 "With oil and gas prices and a higher drilling cost, we've had to look for other ways to progress on the field," Crowe said.
 Inert Production (Denver) said the company has not moved forward at even the "drilling level" level with plans to develop its assets around the plateau.
 "We are re-evaluating there, but it's not clear what you can do to get the field back on track," she said.

 budget re-evaluation that runs out March, said Tom Covey, a FEMA spokesman in Washington.
 Williams Production (Holt) spokesman James Avillar said probably about half of the 240 wells Williams recently drilled per year in the Frontier Basin are under FEMA jurisdiction.
 "There's a pretty heavy program," he said.
 The 240 wells, it would amount to \$1 million.
 The fee has generated \$30 million nationally and about \$15 million in Colorado, including \$2.6 million in northeast

Colorado.
 Avillar said Williams already has drilled 100 wells that are currently producing. The remaining 140 are in place but it hasn't been clear whether they're profitable. But revenue comes back to the local FEMA office, he said.
 The FEMA says the fee prevents it from turning to the U.S. Treasury for the continued cost of preventing drilling the program.
 Avillar questioned the justification for charging \$1,010 per well to Covey in which Williams drills 25 wells in one pad, all with similar permit conditions.
 Eric Wiseman, a spokesman

Notice is hereby given that on Tuesday, April 7, 2009, there will be held at the City of Grand Junction, Colorado, the General Municipal Election. The person shall be permitted to vote in this election without having been registered in vote. Registration books will be open in the Office of the Grand County Clerk & Recorder, Old Mason County Court House, 444 Rural Ave., through the hours of business at 8:30 a.m. Monday, March 9, 2009, for the registration of municipal electors. Registration may also be accomplished by printing the appropriate form in the City Clerk's Office, 250 North 1st Street, Grand Junction, Friday, between the hours of 7:30 a.m. and 5:30 p.m.

Qualifications of Electors
 Every person who has attained the age of eighteen years possessing the following qualifications is entitled to register to vote at all municipal elections:

- (1) Citizen of the United States
- (2) Resident in the state for sixty days and in the municipal election district for thirty days immediately preceding the election

Electoral Districts and Terms
 District A - Four Year Term
 District B - Four Year Term
 District C - Four Year Term
 District D - Four Year Term
 District E - Four Year Term
 City Manager - Four Year Term

Qualifications of Candidates
 Every male of sound mind (18) years of age or older on the date of the election may file a nomination and have his name placed on the City and on the County, as the case may be, from which he might be elected for the purpose of all local offices (1) and receive the same immediately preceding the date of election. In case of a male citizen of any state who has resided in the territory, or in the United States, for one year next to the date of the election for the City and on the date of the election, his name shall be placed on the ballot.
