# PUBLICATION OF ANNUAL AND OTHER REPORTS

\*66. Publicity Records and Reports.—Each of said commissioners shall keep a record book in which shall be recorded a brief but comprehensive record of all department affairs under his charge as soon as performed and shall quarterly render to the city council a full report of all operations and shall quarterly render to the city council a full report of all operations of such department, and shall annually, and oftener if required by the city council, make a synopsis thereof for publication. 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# SUMMARY OF COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

January 18.—Report of the audit of the books of the city by the Colorado

Title & Trust Company received and accepted.

January 28.—Petition of 50 property owners to remove Farmer's ditch received and referred to Mayor and Commissioner of Highways. Council instructed Mayor to instruct attorneys in Kannah Creek case to get a reduction in findings of appraisers or have the findings set aside.

February 8.—Committee on Farmer's ditch given power to act. Mayor reported findings in Kannah Creek case could not be reduced, therefore attorneys were instructed to ask Court for a rehearing of the case, and have

findings of commission set aside.

February 9.—Ordinance providing for the appointment of a temporary

judge of the municipal court passed.

February 23 .- Reports of Commissioners and officers received and accepted. Ordinance No. 176, creating a board of plumbing examiners and providing for examination of plumbers, passed. Commissioner of Water and Sewers instructed to employ city engineer to make necessary surveys and prepare data for proposed Sewer District No. 3. C. E. Cherington, W. P. Ela, Karl A. Bickel, S. B. Hutchinson, Mrs. J. N. Neeb and Mrs. E. B. Wilson appointed Park Commissioners.

March 1 .- The petition of W. P. Ela and others, asking the Council to take necessary steps to sink artesian well, was granted. George Fletcher and Quince Hutton appointed members of plumbing examining board. Resolutions authorizing Commissioner of Health and Civic Beauty to improve Maple Park passed. Commissioner of Finance and Supplies instructed to order necessary casing for proposed artesian well and 3,000 feet of 6-inch

pipe for water department. March 8 .- Council accepted proposition of Hessick & Jones to drill ar-

tesian well, and attorney was instructed to draw up contract.

March 15 .- Ordinance No. 177, regulating the sale of milk, passed. March 17.—Commissioner of Finance and Supplies instructed to order

a 10-ton Port Huron road roller. March 22.—Donation of \$250.00 made to defray expenses of G. A. R.

Encampment. March 31 .- Bids received for proposed sewer district and paving district

April 2.—Resolution passed accepting proposed contract with Wm. E. Sweet & Company for purchase of \$210,000 sewer and paving bonds.

April 12.—Quarterly reports of city officers received. Quince Hutton appointed Plumbing Inspector.

May 3.—Grand Junction Daily News designated official newspaper. May 31.—Committee appointed to investigate water supply of Rapid Creek. Report on 27 samples of city water received from state chemist.

June 7.-O. O. Phillips appointed Fire Chief. J. J. Allison appointed

regular policeman. June 11.—State Chemist reported colon bacilli present in Perry distilled water and Glenwood Springs water, and Health Officer instructed to stop sale of said waters. Ordinance No. 178, providing for creation of local

improvement districts, passed. July 8 .- Ordinance No. 179, an ordinance for the preservation of the

public health, passed.

July 11.—Petition of M. M. Shores and others, asking Council to drill

another artesian well, granted.

July 12.—Quarterly reports of Commissioners and city officers received. Mayor and Commissioner of Water and Sewers appointed committee to secure sites for artesian wells.

July 15.—Contract entered into with Hessick & Jones for Artesian Well No. 2. Special committee reported having secured tract of land from N. A. Lough near city reservoir as site for artesian wells.

July 19.—Resolution passed to create local improvement districts. August 5.—Resolution adopting details and specifications of Sanitary Sewer District No. 3, passed.

August 15.—Ordinance No. 180, providing for an emergency appropriation of \$10,000 for the Water Department, passed.

August 30.—Ordinance No. 181, amending Section 8 of Article 2 of ordinance concerning waterworks, passed.

September 6.—Ordinance No. 182, amending certain sections of Ordinance No. 167, defining sidewalk and curb lines, passed.

September 11 .- Resolution declaring intention to create Paving District

September 20 .- Resolution adopting details and specifications of Paving District No. 1 passed.

September 27 .- Mayor instructed to serve notice upon Denver & Rio Grande Railroad Company to remove obstructions across Lawrence avenue, in Crawford's addition.

October 4-10.—Quarterly reports of Commissioners and city officers

October 17 .- Commissioner of Finance and Supplies submitted annual estimate of receipts and disbursements for next fiscal year.

October 28.—Petition of remonstrance against formation of Paving District No. 1, signed by owners or more than 35 per cent. of the frontage, presented. Resolution passed granting said petition of remonstrance and declaring proposed paving district defeated. Resolution passed authorizing audit of the books of the city, and the formulating of new system of accounting for city.

November 1 .- Arc light ordered placed at White avenue and Twelfth street. Bid for furnishing coal for city pumping plant received. Bid of Book Cliff Railroad Company for \$1.70 per ton accepted. Appointment of J. S. Hynes, Fire Chief; A. L. Talley, Assistant Chief, and George Bowen, Driver fire wagon, confirmed.

November 4.—Ordinance No. 183, permitting erection of illuminated signs, passed. Call for special sewer and water bond election deferred.

November 9.—Suit ordered commenced against Denver & Rio Grande Railroad Company for the assertion and maintenance of the public rights in and to railroad crossing at Lawrence avenue as a public thoroughfare.

November 22.—Annual budget of estimated amounts required to pay the expenses of the city for the next fiscal year, adopted. H. N. Haynes of Greeley, Colo., employed as special counsel in Kannah Creek water condemnation suit.

December 13.—Annual Appropriation ordinance passed. Commissioner of Finance and Supplies instructed to purchase a Standard Motor-propelled Combination Hose Wagon and Chemical Engine for the Fire Department.

December 27-28.—Bids for collection and disposal of garbage rejected. Depository bonds of the city banks accepted. Report of John H. Baker, certified public accountant, of audit of city's books and accounts accepted.

#### ORDINANCE NO. 184

The Annual Appropriation Ordinance of the City of Grand Junction, Colorado, Providing for the Expenses and Liabilities of the City of Grand Junction for the Fiscal Year Beginning January 1st, A. D. 1911, and Ending December 31st, A. D. 1911.

Be It Ordanied by the City Council of the City of Grand Junction, Colorado:
Section 1. That the following sums of money, or so much thereof as may be necessary, be and the same are hereby appropriated for the purpose of defraying the necessary expenses and liabilities of the city of Grand Junction, Colorado, for the fiscal year begining January 1st, A. D. 1911, and ending December 31st, A. D. 1911, to-wit:

leys and Water for Irrigation 10,000.00
Sixth. For the Health Department 5,000.00
Seventh. For Improvement and Care of Public Parks 3,000.00
Eighth. For the Public Library 1,500.00
Ninth. For Salaries of City Officers and Employees 9,500.00
Tenth. For the General Fund 5,500.00
Eleventh. For Interest on Water Bonds 7,350.00

Sec. 2. That for the purpose of defraying the necessary expenses and liabilities of the said city of Grand Junction for the said fiscal year, beginning January 1st, A. D. 1911, and ending December 31st, A. D. 1911, there shall be and hereby is levied and assessed upon all the taxable property situated within the corporate limits of said city of Grand Junction, both real and personal, the following amounts for special and general taxes, to-wit:

First. For the purpose of defraying the annual interest on outstanding water bonds, a special tax of three and three-fourths (3%) mills on each dollar of said property so assessed or to be assessed.

Second. For the purpose of defraying the expenses and maintenance of the free public library, a tax of three-fourths of one (% of 1) mill on each dollar of said property so assessed or to be assessed.

Third. For the purpose of defraying the necessary expenses and liabilities of said city of Grand Junction, a tax of twenty-two and one-half (22 ½) mills is hereby assessed on each dollar of said property so assessed or to be assessed.

Passed and adopted this 13th day of December, A. D. 1910.

INVENTORIES. Herewith is rendered an inventory of equipment, material and supplies on hand January 1st, 1911, at the pumping station, and of pipe, etc., for water main construction:

NOTATIONS.

From the above statement of expenditures it will be noted that \$18,180.64 were expended for the maintenance of the water department, the balance of the total appropriation of \$30,000 for the water fund having been paid for expenses connected with the Kannah creek water condemnation suit and for drilling the two artesian wells.

The \$263.35 paid for repairing sew-

ers was drawn from a special cash fund derived from the Indian sewer

On the petition of prominent citizens and taxpayers, and in an effort to solve the water problem, the Council decided to drill for artesian water, and on March 12th a contract was entered into with Hessick & Jones of Florence Colorado, to sink a well on the ground known as "Palmer Park." At a depth of 740 feet the water began flowing over the top of the well. In the hope of striking a stronger flow, drilling was continued until granite formation was struck at a depth of 1,213 feet. This well has since continued a steady flow of excellent water, variously estimated at from five to seven inches.

Feeling that the first well was not a thorough test of the artesian water possibilities, citizens again petitioned the Council to drill another well, and on July 16th the contract was let for the second well, which was bored near the city reservoir. Here it was necessary to drill 873 feet before the artes. ian flow was struck, and the flow was only about one-fourth as strong as that of the first well. This water was piped to and has since been flowing into the reservoir.

The result of the second boring, as well as on account of the lack of funds, lid not justify, the Water Commissioner and the Council felt, the department to make further attempts to obain a sufficient supply of artesian vater for this city.

The Commissioner believes that the early solution of the water problem of this city lies in the Kannah Creek proposition. True, there are other ources where mountain water might e obtained, but to turn to those now rould mean years of delay before the vater could be turned into our reser-

The matter of obtaining better water for Grand Junction is becoming more and more serious every year. Since the completion of the Gunnison tunnel, practically all the water of the Gunnison river will be conducted over the lands of the Uncompangre valley, and then there will be only seepage water for this city. Something will have to be done and done soon to improve our

water supply. The present pumping plant is the most expensive water-supply plant in the state to operate, yet the City has been furnishing water to its citizens at about half of what the rates are in other cities, most of them having gravity systems at that. The present pumping plant was installed in 1899, and last year it was necessary to put new flues in the boilers, besides making other expensive repairs. Should the City be compelled to continue the pumping of water, two new boilers will have to be put in next year. This will mean a large expenditure. The sooner the City secures mountain water and constructs a gravity system, the better it will be for our citizens both from a financial and health stand-

was a disappointment to the Commissioner as well as to the people residing therein, but has been unavoidable. The preliminary proceedings in connection with the formation of the district of this city. have been completed, and it only remains for the taxpayers to authorize by vote the issuance of the bonds for the construction of the sewers. This election would have been held last fall, but for the delay in the pending water suit. During the month April 37 cases of typhoid were rerted, and for several weeks the tuation became somewhat ararming. le department made a careful invesgation for the purpose of ascerta.n-g, if possible, the cause. The facts tained were made known to the uncil in a special report, and the inclusions were that the unsanitary inditions previous to the general ean-up and bad plumbing in many ouses were the chief causes of the idemic. During the year 121 cases typhoid were reported, 11 of which sulted in death.

Since the passage of the new ordi ince regulating the sale of milk, evy place where milk is produced for le has been inspected, and keepers of owns and owners of dairies are reuired to comply with the provisions f the ordinance before permits to sell ilk are issued. Sixteen applicants ere refused permits, and one dairy, where conditions were very unsantary, vas compelled to go out of business. one more step, the commissioner beeves, should be taken to properly proect the people, especially children, and hat is, the requirement that all dairy attle should be tested for tuberculo-

The department has made every efort to enforce the provisions of the ew health ordinance. #### PARK IMPROVEMENT.

The council having authorized the expenditure of \$1,200.00 in the development of Maple park, the commissioner engaged the services of Mr. W. W. Parce, a landscape architect of Boulder, to prepare plans for the improvement and to superintend the planting.
