Grand Junction, Colorado, June 17th, 1911.

All the Commissioners having been duly notified, the City Council of the City of Grand Junction convened in special session at 10:30 o'clock a.m., in the Council Chamber, City Hall, with Mayor Todd in the chair.

A proposed Memorandum of an Agreement by and between the City of Grand Junction and the Grand Junction and Grand River Valley Railway Company in reference to the paving between and two feet on each side of said railway company's tracks in Paving District No. 1, was presented to the Council and read by the Clerk.

The following resolution was then introduced and read:

Be it Resolved, by the City Council of the City of Grand Junction that the contract drafted between the City and the Grand Junction and Grand River Valley Railway Company, in relation to paving between and two feet on each side of the railway company's tracks in Paving District No. 1, be approved, ratified and adopted by the City, and that the Mayor, and all the Commissioners be instructed and are directed to sign the same for and on behalf of and assign each of the City, and that the City Clerk attest the execution thereof under the seal of said City.

Moved by Commissioner Vedder, seconded by Commissioner Scovill, that the resolution as read be passed and adopted.

Whereas, in accordance with instructions given by the City Council the Commissioner of Finance and Supplies did, for six weeks, publicly advertise for sealed bids for the sale of the \$450,000. Water bonds authorized by a vote of the electors at the special election held April 29th, 1911; and

Whereas, said advertisements were prominently inserted in leading financial journals of Chicago and New York, as well as in the two local papers; and

Whereas, the results obtained from said advertisements were entirely unsatisfactory, only one bid being received, and that one entirely unsatisfactory; and

Whereas, it is the sense of this Council that a more satisfactory sale can be effected by direct negotiations with individual banks and bond dealers; be it therefore

Resolved, That the Commissioners of Finance and Supplies be instructed to use his efforts by correspondence and otherwise, to effect a sale of these bonds at par, or better, at the earliest possible date.

Moved by Commissioner Vorbeck, seconded by Commissioner Scovill, that the resolution as read be passed and adopted.

The motion being put, upon call of roll, the Commissioners voted as follows: Todd, yea; Vedder, yea; Vorbeck, yea; Scovill, yea; Kolmburg, yea.

All the Commissioners having voted yea, the Mayor declared the motion carried and the resolution passed and adopted.

On motion of Commissioner Scovill, seconded by Commissioner Vorbeck, the Council then adjourned.
