WHEREAS, it is the sense of this Council that under the conditions as they exist, the just rate should be as follows: On the three places specified on Orehard Mesa, \$11.50 per annum, and on the barn of J. W. Milne at 260 Colorado evenue, \$40.00 per annum; be it, therefore,

RESOLVED, that the Commissioner of Finance and Supplies be authorized and instructed to make rates as above on the places above mentioned.

Moved by Commissioner Vedder, seconded by Commissioner Rankin, that the resolution as read be passed and adopted.
