

Grand Junction, Colorado, June 10, 1913.

The City Council of the City of Grand Junction convened in regular session at 4 o'clock p. m., in the City Hall, with Mayer Todd in the chair.

The following Commissioners, upon call of roll, responded as present: Todd, Vedder, Verbeck, Rankin, Holmburg.

City Attorney Tupper was present.

The minutes of the regular meeting of June 3d were read approved.

The petition of A. F. Platz and others, asking that the sewer be extended from the south line of the Denver & Rio Grande Railroad in alley between Fourth and Fifth streets south to the outlet of Sewer District No. 3, was presented and read.

On motion of Commissioner Holmburg, seconded by Commissioner Rankin, the petition was referred to the Commissioner of Water and Sewers.

The petition of Henry Frank and others, asking the Council to order a cement sidewalk laid on the north side of Block 39, was presented and read.

Moved by Commissioner Rankin, seconded by Commissioner Vedder, that the following resolution be passed and adopted:

WHEREAS, Henry Frank and others have petitioned for a cement sidewalk to be laid on the north side of Block 39, and

WHEREAS, the Council deems that the construction of said sidewalk is necessary; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that a cement sidewalk be and hereby is ordered constructed in accordance with the provisions of the city ordinance on the north side of Block 39 of the City of Grand Junction; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the City Clerk be and hereby is authorized and instructed to notify the owners of the lots fronting on the north side of said Block 39 to construct a cement sidewalk in front of their respective premises within thirty (30) days after the receipt of said notice.

The motion being put, upon call of roll, the Commissioners voted as follows:

Todd, yea; Vedder, yea; Verbeck, yea; Rankin, yea; Holmburg, yea.

All the Commissioners having voted yea, the Mayor declared the resolution passed and adopted, and the sidewalk ordered constructed.

The bill of A. West for \$72.00, for 25 days labor cleaning grease traps and alleys having been approved and audited, it was moved by Commissioner Verbeck, seconded by Commissioner Rankin, that the same be allowed and a warrant ordered drawn on the Health fund for the amount.

The motion being put, each Commissioner as his name was called voted as follows:

Todd, yea; Vedder, yea; Verbeck, yea; Rankin, yea; Holmburg, yea.

All the Commissioners having voted yea, the Mayor declared the motion carried and the bill allowed.

Moved by Commissioner Verbeck, seconded by Commissioner Vedder, that the City Attorney be instructed to prepare an ordinance imposing a license on clairvoyants, palmists and fortune tellers.

The motion carried.

On motion of Commissioner Verbeck, seconded by Commissioner Vedder, the Council adjourned.
