

Grand Junction, Colorado
November 3, 1915.

The City Council of the City of Grand Junction convened in regular session at four o'clock p. m., in the City Hall, with Mayor Cherrington in the chair.

Upon call of roll, the following Commissioners responded as present: Cherrington, Vorbeck, Rankin, Carson, Holmburg.

City Attorney Tupper was present.

The minutes of the regular meeting of October 26th were read and approved.

Moved by Commissioner Rankin, seconded by Commissioner Carson, that H. A. Polker be given the use of the City screening plant at the rate of one dollar per day for such time as in actual use; provided, that the City may revoke this agreement at any time upon giving Mr. Polker ten days' notice.

The motion being put, upon call of roll, the Commissioners voted as follows: Cherrington, yea; Vorbeck, yea; Rankin, yea; Carson, yea; Holmburg, yea.

All the Commissioners having voted yea, the Mayor declared the motion carried.

The petition of W. J. Darrow and others, asking that an arc light be ordered placed at the intersection of Thirteenth street and Colorado avenue, was presented and read.

On motion of Commissioner Vorbeck, seconded by Commissioner Rankin, the petition was referred to the Mayor.

The monthly report of the City Weigher was submitted and read, and on motion of Commissioner Carson, seconded by Commissioner Vorbeck, the same was referred to the Mayor.

RESOLUTION.

WHEREAS, the City of Grand Junction is the owner of the Public Trustee's certificates of sale for paving assessment of Paving District No. 4 on Lots 4 and 5 in Block 18 in said city, which certificates are dated March 6, 1914, are numbered 15,392 and 15,393 and are for the aggregate amount of \$27.60, and

WHEREAS, the owner of said lots desires to purchase the said certificates, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that the Commissioner of Finance and Supplies is hereby authorized and instructed to sell the said certificates to the owner for the face of the certificates plus interest thereon at eight per cent from the date thereof.

Moved by Commissioner Vorbeck, seconded by Commissioner Carson, that the resolution as read be passed and adopted.

The motion being put, upon call of roll, the Commissioners voted as follows: Cherrington, yea; Vorbeck, yea; Rankin, yea; Carson, yea; Holmburg, yea.

All the Commissioners having voted yea, the Mayor declared the motion carried and the resolution passed and adopted.

Moved by Commissioner Holmburg, seconded by Commissioner Rankin, that R. L. Magill, notary public; C. B. Rich, notary public, and G. W. Armstrong, Justice of the Peace, be appointed to act on the canvassing board in place of Commissioners Vorbeck, Rankin and Holmburg, candidates for re-election, for the canvass of the returns of the general municipal election, held November 2, 1915.

The motion carried, and it was so ordered.

Gentlemen:-
