

Grand Junction, Colorado  
November 26, 1915.

The City Council of the City of Grand Junction convened in regular adjourned session at four o'clock p. m., in the City Hall, with Mayor Cherrington in the chair.

The following Commissioners, upon call of roll, responded as present: Cherrington, Carson, Vorbeck, Blackstone, Holmburg.

City Attorney Tupper was present.

The following resolution was introduced and read:

RESOLUTION.

WHEREAS, The Denver & Rio Grande Railroad Company has heretofore filed objections in writing to the assessment against said company in Paving and Sidewalk District Number Five, which objections have been carefully considered by the City Council; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that the said written objections, and each of them, are hereby overruled, and the apportionment heretofore made is hereby confirmed.

Moved by Commissioner Holmburg, seconded by Commissioner Carson, that the resolution as read be passed and adopted.

The motion being put, upon call of roll, the Commissioners voted as follows: Cherrington, yea; Carson, yea; Vorbeck, yea; Blackstone, yea; Holmburg, yea.

All the Commissioners having voted yea, the Mayor declared the motion carried and the resolution passed and adopted.

A proposed ordinance, entitled "An Ordinance Approving the Whole Cost of the Improvements Made in and for Paving and Sidewalk District No. 5 in the City of Grand Junction, Colorado, Pursuant to Ordinance Number 178, adopted and approved June 11, 1910, as Amended, and Pursuant to the Resolutions and Proceedings of the City Council, Adopted Pursuant to said Ordinance Number 178 as Amended, Approving the Apportionment of said Costs to each Lot or Tract of Land in said District, Assessing the Share of Said Cost Against Each Lot or Tract of Land in said District, and Prescribing the Manner for the Collection and Payment of said Assessment," was introduced and read.

Moved by Commissioner Vorbeck, seconded by Commissioner Blackstone, that the proposed ordinance as read be passed for publication.

The motion being put, upon call of roll, the Commissioners voted as follows: Cherrington, yea; Carson, yea; Vorbeck, yea; Blackstone, yea; Holmburg, yea.

All the Commissioners having voted yea, the Mayor declared the motion carried and the proposed ordinance passed for publication.

The City Clerk submitted to the Council a list of names of persons whose names appear on the registration lists of the several voting precincts of the City and not shown on the poll lists to have voted at the regular municipal election held November 2, 1915, which list was duly certified to as a full, true and correct list of the names of all persons not voting at said election.

Moved by Commissioner Vorbeck, seconded by Commissioner Carson, that the list of names of persons not voting at the last regular municipal election, held November 2, 1915, as submitted by the Clerk, be accepted by the Council, and that the Clerk be instructed to notify all persons whose names appear on said list to appear on one of the following named days before a committee of the City Council, viz.: Wednesday, December 8; Wednesday, December 15, and Wednesday, December 22, 1915, to show satisfactory cause why their names should be retained on the registration lists of the city, according to the provisions of Ordinance No. 212.

The motion carried, and the Mayor thereupon, in accordance with the provisions of said Ordinance No. 212, appointed Commissioners Vorbeck and Holmburg to serve, with himself, as a committee to sit on the days named in said notice to hear reasons why the names of such persons not voting at said election should be retained on the registration lists of the several voting precincts of the City.

On motion of Commissioner Carson, seconded by Commissioner Vorbeck, the Council then adjourned.
