Grand Junction, Colorado

August 19, 1925.

The City Council of the City of Grand Junction met in regular session at 7:30 o'clock P.M. with President Bell presiding. Those present and answering at roll call were Councilmen Ellison, Logsden, Meders, Moslander, Short & Bell; City Manager Thompson, Coty Attorney Hinman & City Clerk Peck. City Councilman Bear was absent.

The minutes of the last regular session were approved as read.

S.G. Mc Mullen appeared before the Council for the Avalon Theater Co, in regard to sewer stoppage which causes the basement of the Avalon Theater to become flooded at times. After discussion by the Council Councilman Meders moved, seconded by Councilman Moslander that the City Attorney be instructed to draft an ordinance prohibiting the use of hopper closets in the City. Motion carried.

Scott Heckman was present in the interests of the Robinson Service Corp. asking permission to erect, maintain and operate a whole sale storage gasolene tank station within the corporate limits of the City of Grand Junction, the location of which being designated on a plat filed with the City Council.

Councilman Meders moved, seconded by Councilman Moslander that the City Council grant the Robinson Service Corporation a permit to erect, Maintain & operate a wholesale storage gasolene tank station on property owned by the Denver & Rio Grande Western Ry. Co. at a location designated on a plat filed with the Council, this date and being South west of the Mesa Flour Mills and between Fifth & Seventh Streets. The motion being put all the Councilmen present voted Yea, and the President declared the motion carried.

M.N. Due Mgr of the G.J. Ice Cream Co. appeared before the Council

asking permission to construct a corrugated iron shed adjacent to the building occupied and owned by them at 225 Main Street. Councilman Meders moved, seconded by Councilman Logsden that the matter be referred to the City Manager & City Attorney for further investigation. Motion carried.

Mr Giga requested permission to use Lincoln Park for the holding of an agricultural fair. Upon motion of Councilman Short, seconded by Councilman Meders the matter was referred to the City Manager.

J.W. Watson was present asking the City Council to establish a lower water rate for water used in his green houses on Orchard Mesa. After discussion by the Council the City Attorney was instructed to amend the present ordinance fixing water rates for industries, manufactories & schools located without the city limits so that the same would include green houses. The water rate to be charged said industries ect to be 1.3 times the meter rates charged within the City limits. This motion was moved by Councilman Meders & seconded by Councilman Ellison.

The Clerk presented an affidavit of publishing, and his certificate of posting notices of the special bond election held in the said City on the 18th day of August, A.D. 1925, which affidavit and certificate were ordered placed on file

Thereupon the City Council proceeded to canvass the returns of said election, which returns were as follows

WHEREAS, on the 19th day of August A.D. 1925, the City Council duly canvassed the results of said election which were as follows, to-wit:

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GRAND JUNCTION,:

That said bond election was held in strict conformity with the laws of the State of Colorado, and the charter and ordinances of said city, and it is hereby declared that more than a majority of the votes cast at said elect on were for the issuance of street intersection bonds in the sum of eighty-six thousand dollars (\$86,000.00).

Councilman Meders moved, seconded by Councilman Moslander that the resolution as read be passed and adopted. Upon which motion the following vote was cast: Councilmen voting Yea, Ellison, Logsden,

Meders, Moslander, Short & Bell. All the Councilmen present voting Yea, the President declared the motion carried.

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS An ordinance entitled "AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE ASSISTANCE BY THE CITY OF GRAND JUNCTION IN THE PURCHASE OF A SITE FOR THE JUNIOR COLLEGE OF GRAND JUNCTION, COLORADO, AND PROVIDING FOR THE APPROPRIATION THEREFOR" was submitted to the qualified electors of the City of Grand Junction at the Special election held August 18th 1925, for their adoption or rejection.

That at said election 549 voters voted in favor of the adoption of said ordinance and 94 voters voted against the adoption of said Ordinance the majority thereof voting in favor of the adoption and passage of said Ordinance.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GRAND JUNCTION; that the said Ordinance be numbered as the Peoples Ordinance No.18 and that the said ordinance be published once in the Daily Sentinel of Grand Junction, Colorado, properly certified to.

Councilman Short moved, seconded by Councilman Moslander that the resolution as read be passed and adopted, upon which motion the following vote was cast: Councilmen voting Yea, Councilmen Ellison, Logsden, Meders, Moslander, Short & Bell. All the Councilmen present voting Yea, the President declared the motion carried and the resolution duly passed and adopted.

RESOLUTION:

WHEREAS An ordinance entitled" AN ORDINANCE CONCERNING THE VACATING OF A PORTION OF SOUTH SEVENTH STREET, IN THE CITY OF GRAND JUNCTION, COLORADO, AND THE SELLING THEREOF TO THE ADJOINING PROPERTY OWNERS" was submitted to the qualified electors of the City of Grand Junction at the Special election held August 18 1925, for their adoption or rejection.

That at said election 458 voters voted in favor of the adoption of said ordinance and 183 voters voted against the adoption of said ordinance, the majority thereof voting in favor of the adoption and passage of said ordinance.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GRAND JUNCTION; that the said Ordinance be numbered People's Ordinance No. 19 and that the said ordinance be published once in the Daily Sentinel of Grand Junction, Colorado, properly certified to. That the proper conveyance be executed said adjoining property owners in payment of the purchase price as fixed by the appraisers as set forth in said ordinance.

Councilman Meders moved, seconded by Councilman Short that the resolution as read be passed and adopted, upon which motion the following vote was cast: Councilmen voting Yea, Ellison, Logsden, Meders, Moslander, Short & Bell. All the Councilmen present voting Yea, the President declared the motion carried and the resolution duly passed and adopted.

Chas Volland made application for a permit to install a gasolene pump at the curb at his property 524 N. First Street. Upon motion of Councilman Logsden seconded by Councilman Meders the permit was granted.

Upon motion of Councilman Meders, seconded by Councilman Moslander The Continental Oil Company was granted a permit to install a curb gasolene pump at the Kimmell & Eaton garage at 319 Colorado Ave.

Upon motion of Councilman Meders, seconded by Councilman Moslander G.W. Morton at 344 South was granted a permit to operate a rooming house.

The meeting adjourned upon motion of Councilman Logsden, seconded by Councilman Ellison.
