

Grand Junction, Colo.,

April 27th, 1927.

The City Council of the City of Grand Junction met in regular adjourned session at 7:30 o'clock P. M. with President Bell presiding. Those present and answering at roll call were Councilmen Bear, Meders, Fairley, Moslander, Ellison, Logsdon, Bell. City Manager Thompson, City Attorney Hinman, and City Clerk Niles were present.

Delegations from the Presbyterian Church, Congregational Church, Court House, and Christian Science Church were present and presented protests to the Council, against the construction of a gas filling station at the corner of Sixth and White Avenues, for which a permit had been granted by them. The matter was discussed, and it was decided that nothing could be done at this time, as the property had already changed hands.

The bond of Charles Koehler, plumber, was presented by the Clerk, having been approved by the City Attorney. Councilmen Meders moved, seconded by Councilman Bear that the bond be accepted and filed. Motion carried.

City Manager Thompson presented a request from J. A. Harrison to install a curb gas pump with an awning over it, on South Fifth Street, near the bridge. The matter was discussed, and the point brought out that Mr. Harrison's sister had already been allowed a permit to build a filling station at this location. Councilman Logsdon moved, Councilman Bear seconded that the request for a curb gas pump with an awning over it be refused. Motion carried.

City Manager Thompson stated that he had received the final zoning plans from Mr. S. R. DeBoer, and also a statement of the balance due him for this work.

Councilman Moslander moved, seconded by Councilman Bear that the bill be approved in the sum of \$1000.00, the balance to be held until the final approval of the proposed plans by the zoning commission. Upon which motion the following vote was cast: Councilmen voting "Yea", Bear, Meders, Fairley, Logsdon, Ellison, Moslander, Bell. All the Councilmen voting "Yea" the President declared the motion carried, and the City Clerk was instructed to make out a warrant for \$1000.00.

The matter of the payment of the policemen's uniforms was again brought up. President Bell, and Councilman Bear reporting that they had met with City Manager Thompson, Asst. Chief Decker, and Patrolman Martin and discussed the matter. Councilman Bear moved, Seconded by Councilman Logsdon that the City pay \$200.00 to the Fair Store on the account of the policemen's uniforms, with the understanding that the police department are to refund the money to the City as soon as possible. Upon which motion the following

vote was cast. Councilmen voting "Yea", Moslander, Logsdon, Ellison, Fairley, Bear, Meders, Bell. All the Councilmen voting "Yea", the President declared the motion carried, and instructed the City Clerk to draw a warrant for the sum of \$200.00 in favor of The Fair Store.

Councilman Bear moved, seconded by Councilman Meders that Mr. Hinman be allowed \$150.00 for defense to date in the case of Ferrin against Decker and others. Upon which motion the following vote was cast: Councilmen voting "Yea", Moslander, Logsdon, Ellison, Fairley, Meders, Bear, Bell. All The Councilmen voting "Yea, the President declared the motion carried.

There being no further business to come before the meeting, on motion of Councilman Fairley, seconded by Councilman Ellison, the meeting adjourned until 10 o'clock A. M., May, 2nd, 1927.
