Grand Junction, Colorado

May 1, 1933

The City Council of the City of Grand Junction, Colorado, met in regular session at 10:00 o'clock A. M. Those present and answering at roll call were: Councilmen Glassford, Hirons, Holcombe, Roberts, Sievert and President Hall. Councilman Bear was absent. City Manager Soderstrum City Attorney Adams, and City Clerk Tomlinson were present.

The minutes of the meeting held April 19th were read and approved.

The following resolution was presented and read:

RESOLUTION

The existing City Council of the City of Grand Junction which retires from office on the 1st day of May, 1933, desires to have spread upon the records of the Council this brief testimonial of its appreciation of the worth of the services of one of its members, to-wit: Herman Bear, who is now ill. Mr. Bear has served as a member of this Council continuously since October, 1924, and it is the unanimous opinion of his associates that, during all of this period, he has endeavored to and has served his constituents faithfully and well, that he has at all times safeguarded the interests of the City to the best of his ability, and that he has gained the respect and confidence, not only of his associates, but of all the officers and employees of the City with whom he has come in contact.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED That it is with sincere expressions of regard that we offer to Mr. Bear and to the members of his family this slight recognition of his worth as a public servant.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED That a copy of this resolution be transmitted to Mr. Bear.

It was moved by Councilman Glassford and seconded by Councilman Roberts that the resolution as read be passed and adopted. Roll was called with the following result: Councilmen voting AYE - Glassford, Hirons, Holcombe, Roberts, Sievert, and Hall. Councilmen voting NO - None. All of the Councilmen present voting AYE, the President declared the motion carried.

City Manager Soderstrum reported that he had gone to Denver and consulted with the State Highway officials regarding the sidewalks on South Fifth Street, and that the State Highway Department agreed that the City forces replace the sidewalks; payment to be made out of the City's 3% gas money.

Mr. Soderstrum also reported that he consulted with the State Board of Health regarding the plumbing ordinance, and that it had been decided it would be necessary to put through a bill through the State Legislature, giving the same rights to Cities of the second class as first class cities now have. He consulted with Rep. Aspinall, and found a bill in which this matter could be presented.

The minutes of this meeting were read and approved.

It was moved by Councilman Hirons and seconded by Councilman Glassford that the Council adjourn sine die.
