Grand Junction, Colorado November 19, 1952

The City Council of the City of Grand Junction met in regular session at 7:30 o'clock, P. M. Councilmen present and answering roll call were Hanson, Severson, Harper, Colescott, Hoisington and President Ela. Councilman Walt was absent. Also present were City Manager Toyne, City Attorney Groves, and City Clerk Tomlinson.

It was moved by Councilman Colescott and seconded by Councilman Hoisington that the minutes of the regular meeting held November 5th be approved as written. Motion carried.

MILL LEVY 1953 - 19 MILLS. The approval of the State Tax Commission for a levy of 19 mills for the year 1953 had been received, and the Council proceeded with the formal approval of the budget. The following resolution was presented and read:

It was moved by Councilman Hanson and seconded by Councilman Hoisington that the Resolution be passed and adopted as read. Roll was called on the motion with all members of the Council present voting "AYE." The President declared the motion carried.

APPROPRIATION ORDINANCE. A proposed ordinance entitled "AN ORDINANCE APPROPRIATING CERTAIN SUMS OF MONEY TO DEFRAY THE NECESSARY EXPENSES AND LIABILITIES OF THE CITY OF GRAND JUNCTION, COLORADO, FOR THE FISCAL YEAR BEGINNING JANUARY 1, 1953, AND ENDING DECEMBER 31, 1953," was presented and read: It was moved by Councilman Hanson and seconded by Councilman Hoisington that the ordinance be passed for publication. Motion carried.

MAUPIN LIQUOR LICENSE APPLICATION CONTINUED 2 WEEKS. Continuation of the hearing on the application of Corwin and Gene Maupin for a retail liquor store license at 2428 North Ave. was held. A petition signed by some 51 residents in favor of issuing the license to the Maupins was presented. A petition signed by a large number of residents protesting the issuance of the license was also presented but it was not presented in time so that the signatures could be studied to see whether or not they were all residents of the City.

It was moved by Councilman Harper and seconded by Councilman Hoisington that the Council feels the needs and requirements of the community and especially along North Ave. may have changed and bears reconsideration in regard to the issuance of liquor licenses and that the hearing concerning the issuance of a retail liquor store license for Gene and Corwin Maupin at 2428 North Ave. be continued for two weeks to give all interested a chance to express an opinion as to whether or not they are in favor of granting this license. Motion carried.

The Council also expressed the idea that it might be well to consider the change of zoning on North Ave. to business whenever it seems there is a demand for business property along this street.

T. and Verna I. Culley at the American Legion Building be advertised for hearing on December 17th. Motion carried.

RENEW NOTHSTINE 3.2 BEER LICENSE - INTERSTATE CIGAR STORE. Mr. Jas. S. Nothstine, Interstate Cigar Co., 321 Main St., presented an application for renewal of his 3.2 beer license. It was moved by Councilman Hanson and seconded by Councilman Colescott that the license be renewed. Motion carried.

<u>PENSION ORDINANCE PASSED #867.</u> The Proof of Publication to the proposed ordinance entitled "AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO EMPLOYEES' PENSIONS AND TO AMEND ORDINANCE NO. 801," was presented and read. It was moved by Councilman Harper and seconded by Councilman Severson that the proof of publication be accepted and filed. Motion carried.

It was then moved by Councilman Hanson and seconded by Councilman Harper that the ordinance be called up for final passage. Motion carried.

The ordinance was then read and upon motion of Councilman Hoisington and seconded by Councilman Harper the ordinance was passed, adopted, numbered 867 and ordered published. Roll was called on the motion with all members of the Council present voting "AYE." The President declared the motion carried.

DENNING PROTESTS ALLEY CONDITION 1300 BLOCK ON GRAND. Mr. R. Denning appeared before the Council and reported that the alley in back of his property in the 1300 block on Grand Ave. between Grand and Ouray was in very bad condition since the installation of gas mains and asked that inasmuch as it was a paved alley that the paving be replaced.

City Manager Toyne and City Engineer Burton were requested to investigate this alley and see what could be done towards the restoration of the paving.

D. & R. G. W. R. R. TO GET SEWER TAP ne D. & R.G.W.R.R. requested permission to tap onto the State Home & Training School sewer line for sewer facilities

for their buildings in their new classification yard. Permission for the sewer connection for the State Home and Training School was by revocable permit between the State Home and Training School and the City. It was moved by Councilman Harper and seconded by Councilman Hoisington that the request be granted and a revocable permit with the D.&R.G.W.R.R. be entered into to provide for the sewer facilities to their new buildings with the approval of the State Home and Training School. Motion carried.

## RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, on the 19th day of December, 1945, the City Council of the City of Grand Junction adopted a resolution granting a revocable license to the State of Colorado Home and Training School for Mental Defectives, hereinafter referred to as "The State Home," to connect its property to the sewer system of the City of Grand Junction at 9th Street and South Avenue; and

WHEREAS, The Denver and Rio Grande Western Railroad Company, hereinafter referred to as "The Railroad," has requested permission to dispose of the sewage from its Yard Office Building located north of The State Home through the City sewer system by connecting its sewer lines onto the sewer line of The State Home; and

WHEREAS, the City Council does hereby find, determine and declare that the public health of the City of Grand Junction will be served by disposing of the sewage from such building through the sewer system of the City of Grand Junction; and that the sewer system of the City of Grand Junction is adequate for all requirements of the City as well as the requirements of The State Home and the requirements of the said Yard Office Building of The Railroad;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GRAND JUNCTION, COLORADO:

That a revocable license be issued to The Railroad permitting it to dispose of the sewage from its Yard Office Building through the sewer system of the City of Grand Junction by connecting its sewer line from said building to the sewer line of The State Home upon the terms, conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth:

- 1. Such license may be rescinded and revoked by the City Council at its pleasure at any time.
- 2. Such license shall be effective only during such time as The Railroad is permitted by The State Home so to use The State Home's sewer line, and, if such permission is revoked, terminated or expires, this license shall thereupon terminate.
- 3. The Railroad shall, at its own expense, purchase and install a water meter for the measurement of water used at its Yard Office Building, and said building shall be separately piped for such purpose. There shall be paid to the City for the privilege of discharging the sewage from said building into the City sewer system a rental charge

equal to 15% of the amount which would be charged for water used at said Yard Office Building if such water were purchased as the only water used upon premises located outside the corporate limits of the City.

4. This license shall be subject to the terms and provisions of the Resolution of December 19, 1945, and shall also be subject to all Ordinances of the City of Grand Junction.

WATER BILL ADJUSTMENTS. The following requests for adjustments in water bills were made:

- a. Mrs. Roy Gale, 520 W. Main, requested an adjustment because of a service line leak. Her October 1st bill showed a usage of 96,300 gallons of water amounting to \$21.10. In the comparable quarter for 1951, she used 80,400 gallons of water amounting to \$18.36. It was moved by Councilman Hanson and seconded by Councilman Harper that Mrs. Gale's water bill be adjusted at \$18.36. Roll was called on the motion with all members of the Council present voting "AYE." The President declared the motion carried.
- b. Mr. T. S. Golden, owner of property at 261 South Ave., requested an adjustment due to a service line leak. The October 1st bill shows a usage of 104,000 gallons of water amounting to \$31.15. Last year, the usage was 18,900 gallons amounting to \$7.74. It was moved by Councilman Colescott and seconded by Councilman Hanson that the water bill for 261 South Ave. be adjusted to \$7.74. Roll was called on the motion with all members of the Council present voting "AYE." The President declared the motion carried.

<u>BONDS APPROVED.</u> Cement contractors bonds were presented, having been approved as to form by City Attorney Groves, for A. M. Vale and Earl Barbour, dba Barbour Construction Co. It was moved by Councilman Harper and seconded by Councilman Hoisington that the bonds be accepted and filed. Motion carried.

REQUEST NARROW GAUGE ENGINE FROM D&RGW. It was moved by Councilman Hoisington and seconded by Councilman Harper that the Chamber of Commerce be requested to ask the D.&R.G.W.R.R. for a narrow gauge engine informing them that the City would find a place for the engine if it could be obtained. Motion carried.

REFUSE SHORTER HOURS FOR FIREMEN. Consideration of shorter hours for the firemen was given and it was the opinion of a majority of the Council that at the present time, it would be impossible for the Council to go along with shorter hours which would necessitate the hiring of more men and a raise in wages. They also stated that other city employees had requested shorter hours and that this had been denied in favor of a wage increase. It was moved by Councilman Hoisington and seconded by Councilman Harper that the matter be tabled and that the City Manager be instructed to keep it before him and make a further study. Motion carried.

FRUITVALE WANTS COLLBRAN WATER. City Attorney Groves reported that he had attended a meeting in Fruitvale concerning the Collbran project and that the people in this area who attended the meeting had voted in favor of being in the area affected by the Collbran project. He also said that Fruita was apparently becoming interested in receiving water from this project.

TO SURVEY FOR NEW JAIL. It was moved by Councilman Hoisington and seconded by Councilman Harper that the City Manager, City Engineer and Chief of Police make a survey concerning the cost and feasibility of constructing a new jail building. Motion carried.

<u>DITCH TROUBLE 19TH FROM ORCHARD TO MESA.</u> Councilman Harper presented a petition which had been given to him asking that the ditch between Orchard Ave. and Mesa on 19th St. be removed. It was his understanding that there was some possibility that the property owner who uses water out of this ditch might subdivide and sell his land and if that is the case the ditch could be discontinued. It was moved by Councilman Harper and seconded by Councilman Hanson that City Engineer Burton write a letter to Mr. Wm. E. Parks explaining this situation and in the meantime the petition be filed. Motion carried.

It was moved by Councilman Hanson and seconded by Councilman Hoisington that the meeting be adjourned. Motion carried.

Dear Sir:

Pursuant to verbal negotiations instigated November 15, 1952, we desire permission to connect to the Grand Junction City disposal system through a connection at T-16 manhole on the 10 inch State Home sewer and in accordance with the terms of Treasurer's Contract No. 17624 between the Denver & Rio Grande Western Railroad and the State of Colorado dated June 6, 1945.

The estimated maximum flow anticipated from our facilities will be 75 gallons per minute and will consist of waste from toilets, wash basins and floor drains.

It is our understanding the sewerage charge will be based upon the flow as developed when our facilities are in operation since the metered water to our yard is used for other purposes also.
