#### ROLL CALL

In accordance with the ordinances of the City of Grand Junction and special notice having been served on each member of the Council, a Special Meeting was held in the Civic Auditorium at the City Hall at 7:30 p.m. on August 19, 1968. Council members present and answering roll call were: R. B. Evans, Stanley R. Anderson, Herbert M. Wright, and President R. r. Youngerman. Councilmen Harry O. Colescott and Ray A. Meacham, and City Attorney Ashby were absent. Also present were City Manager Richard N. Gray and City Clerk Helen C. Tomlinson. Also present were City Engineer Davis Hickman, Civil Engineer Emery White, Finance Director William Manchester, Office Supervisor William Reeves, Utilities Superintendent Al Wing and Plant Operators Dave Franklin and James Vancil.

# METRO SEWER - WATER POLLUTION CONTROL - REPORT BY H.D.R. ON FOUR PROPOSED PLANS FOR SEWER PLANTS

Messrs. William Bredar and Karl Henrichsen from Henningson, Durham and Richardson, Consulting Engineers, were present and told those present about the plans they have formulated for waste disposal and water pollution control for the City. They have tentatively considered four plans, so the Council may consider which one it prefers.

<u>Plan No. 1</u> would enlarge and remodel both the Westside and Southside plants, and would cost about \$1,714,100. Deducting the \$514,200 grant which would be Federal Aid, the City would have to pay \$1,200,000.

<u>Plan No. 2</u> would abandon the Southside plant and enlarge the Westside plant and build the South Intercepter Sewer line. This cost would be \$1,523,550 for the City and \$649,900 for Federal Aid, or a total cost of \$2,173,450. There is also an option on phasing the construction of the South Intercepter sewer.

<u>Plan No. 3</u> would abandon both of the present sewage disposal plants and construct a new plant near  $24\ 1/2\ \text{Road}$ ; build the Force Main and pumping station, and build the southside intercepter sewer. This plan would cost \$2,417,820 for the City, \$1,022,730 for Federal Aid for a total of \$3,440,650. There is allowed the amount of \$31,500 for land and easements.

<u>Plan No. 4</u> This would be the original plan presented some months ago and would be built at or near 23 Road at a cost of \$3,994,340.

Mr. Bredar showed aerial photos of the proposed plants and explained the manner of treating the sewage at each plant. He stated that the State Health Department asks that the City have its new facilities ready for operation by Jan. 1, 1971, and that in order to accomplish this, the Council will have to make decisions and move right along.

The Council will study all four plans and decide which will be the best system, economically and politically. The first three proposed plans would serve an area of 39 square miles and the fourth plan, an area of 55 square miles, and would accommodate a population estimated for the 39 square mile area up to at least 1980.
