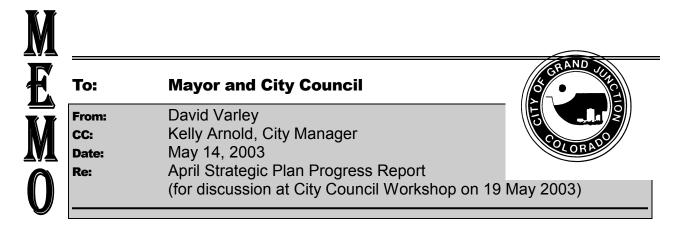

Action Step 24.A: Prioritize the tier one projects (Parks Master Plan) and submit them to the Parks Board for review. (April 2003)

<u>Progress</u>: The projects have been prioritized in the following order:

- 1. Complete/continue development of Canyon View Park
- 2. Develop undeveloped neighborhood park sites
- 3. Improve existing park sites
- 4. Improve existing school/park sites
- 5. Canal trail development

This Action Step is now **completed**.

Action Step 25.A: Prepare and submit a report on school/park development models for review by the Parks Board and School District 51. (April 2003)

<u>Progress</u>: Staff is in the process of compiling data and doing research for this project. The final report will be presented to the Parks and Recreation Advisory Board in September 2003.

<u>Action Step 26.A:</u> Community Development Department and City Council submit the grant application (Historic Survey, Phase Two). (April 2003)

<u>Progress:</u> A grant application was submitted to the Colorado Historical Society on March 26, 2003 for the April 1, 2003 grant round deadline to fund the next phase of a survey of historic resources in neighborhoods around the periphery of the downtown. This area includes a high concentration of 1930s to post-World War II era construction. The total cost of the project is \$100,000, with \$60,000 requested from the State and the match of \$40,000 from the City. Acknowledgement of receipt of the application was received April 16, 2003 which stated that it met eligibility requirements. Notification of results of the grant review will be made by July 21, 2003. This Action Step is now **completed**.

SHELTER AND HOUSING THAT ARE ADEQUATE

Action Step 30.B: Work with the appropriate developers to identify and stimulate interest in an affordable housing project. (April 2003)

<u>Progress</u>: Before we can work effectively with potential developers of affordable housing we need to have some specific items to offer or discuss with them. Some of these items will be developed in Action Step 33.A (to be completed in July) which identifies parts of our code which may be detrimental to affordable housing. Other items are incentives which still need to be adopted or endorsed by City Council. Because these other tasks need to be accomplished first, the team recommends that the completion date for this Action Step be moved from April to September 2003.

<u>Action Step 31.B:</u> City staff will work with the Housing Authority to develop criteria such as location and availability of infrastructure (for affordable housing). The department head team will prioritize sites. (April 2003)

Action by City Council requested <u>Progress</u>: Staff worked with the Housing Authority to develop criteria and identify sites. Department Heads met to review the information and prioritize the possible sites. This information will be provided as part of the complete housing package to be presented to City Council in August. The City Manager is recommending that the City Council schedule a meeting with the Housing Authority to review this Strategic Plan item in August 2003. This Action Step is completed.

<u>Action Step 34.A:</u> Work with the local Housing Coalition or Oversight Committee to inventory the services (transient/shelter) that are currently available.

<u>Progress:</u> City staff has worked with the Housing Authority on this Action Step. A "Community Resources" list has been obtained which identifies the services that are currently available in the community. A copy of this list is attached (page 8). This Action Step is **completed**.

Alternative Contract Awards

Alternative #1 \$1,316,851

Maintains funding for Darla Jean and Paradise Hills improvements but excludes two of six tennis courts, and requires a contingency transfer of \$7,124.

Alternative #2 \$1,402,727 Eliminates Darla Jean and Paradise Hills improvements, and includes all add-alternates.

Alternative #3 \$1,329,527

Maintains funding for Darla Jean and Paradise Hills improvements but eliminates native seed and temporary irrigation, and requires a contingency transfer of \$19,800.

Alternative #4 \$1,402,727

This includes funding for Darla Jean and Paradise Hills improvements and includes all add-alternates, but requires a contingency transfer of \$93,000.

Alternative #5 \$1,402,727 Maintains \$12,000 in funding for Darla Jean and \$31,000 in funding for Paradise Hills Park improvements, includes all add-alternates, but requires a contingency transfer of \$43,000.

Action Requested/Recommendation:

Based upon the November 21,2002 City Council workshop with the Parks and Recreation Advisory Board, there appears to be two preferred alternatives:

If it is the desire of the City Council to maintain or not revise funding for Darla Jean and Paradise Hills improvements and to minimize the contingency expenditure for Canyon View – East, it is recommended the City Council adopt alternative #1, authorizing the City Manager to execute a contract with Sorter Construction for improvements to Canyon View – East, for the base bid improvements including alternates A, B, D, E & F for a total price of <u>\$1,316,851.00</u>. This maintains funding for Darla Jean and Paradise Hills improvements and permits the construction of 4 of 6 tennis courts included in the base bid and add-alternates.

If the City Council wants to take advantage of favorable bids, avoid mobilization costs and defer the continued development of Darla Jean and Paradise Hills improvements until 2004, It is recommended that the City Council adopt alternative #2, authorizing the City Manager to execute a contract with Sorter Construction for improvements to Canyon View-East, base bid improvements including add-alternates A,B,C,D,E & F for a total price of <u>\$1,402,727</u>.

Summary:

Council will discus the formation of a street improvement district (SID) in the El Poso neighborhood including possible cost allocation alternatives. Additionally, Council will discuss storm water improvements for the area and improvements to Crosby Avenue.

Budget: N/A

Action Requested/Recommendation:

Does Council want us to pursue, with the neighborhood, any street improvement proposal. Should Council want to pursue a proposal, would Council want it to be part of the 2004-2005 budget process?

Background Information:

Residents from this neighborhood have discussed with Council, their desire to improve the area street system including the construction of local drainage improvements, curb & gutter and sidewalk improvements. This area qualifies for the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program and was one of the projects considered last year for the program. Ultimately, this project was not selected for the 2002 CDBG program, but staff was asked to develop options for a SID that would allocate the cost of these improvements among area property owners and the City for Council's consideration. Staff has also included a review the area storm water basin improvements and improvements to Crosby Avenue that Council may want to consider.

Street Improvement District Cost Allocation Alternatives

Each of the three following cost allocation models assumes a different level of financial participation by the City for the street improvements within the El Poso area. The specific improvements include asphalt pavement, concrete curbs & gutters, storm drain inlets and construction of sidewalks per our design standards. Typically, the cost to the adjoining property owner is assessed over a 10 year period.

The City has flexibility to create a variety of funding allocation alternatives for the street construction costs among property owners and the City including the use of CDBG funds. The following alternatives were developed by staff as examples with the understanding that the creation of the district must also be approved by a vote of affected property owners.

Option 1

This cost allocation (see option 1 on the attachment) is the typical model we use and is based on the length of the lot abutting the street.

This cost allocation (see attachment) is a modification to the typical model and assumes the property owners share of the costs per abutting foot of the lot are higher than option one.

Storm Water Improvements

In the event a street improvement district is successfully created in the El Poso area, several significant drainage improvements for the entire basin should also be completed. These improvements are designed to protect the neighborhood from the 100 year storm event and consist of constructing bores under the adjacent railroad tracks, crossing Crosby Ave with storm drain lines and installing downstream piping improvements to the river. Because these improvements benefit the entire drainage basin, (beyond the El Poso neighborhood) staff is recommending the project be included in the City's Capital Improvement

The total cost estimate for this regional drainage improvement is estimated to be \$796,000.

Crosby Avenue Street improvements

The recent development of the Rimrock Mall is expected to increase traffic volumes on this section of Crosby Ave.. Currently Crosby Ave. between 25 ½ Road and Main Street is a paved 2 lane roadway with some existing concrete curb & gutter between 25 ½ Road and Maldonado Street. The necessary improvements to this roadway include road widening, drainage improvements, curb & gutter with sidewalk on one side of the road and a fence adjacent to the railroad tracks.

The estimated cost for these improvements is \$625,000.

Funding Options for Crosby Ave. and Storm Water Improvements

The City's 10-year plan for capital improvements does not currently include either Crosby Ave. or the storm water basin improvements. There is some flexibility in this plan, however, the Riverside Parkway and 29 Road projects are both planned to be constructed in phases over the next 10-years, and actually require additional phases beyond 10-years to complete. As a result, to add projects to the 10-year plan requires other projects currently in the plan to be delayed.

Projects that could be delayed with their funding reallocated to Crosby Ave. and the recommended drainage improvements include:

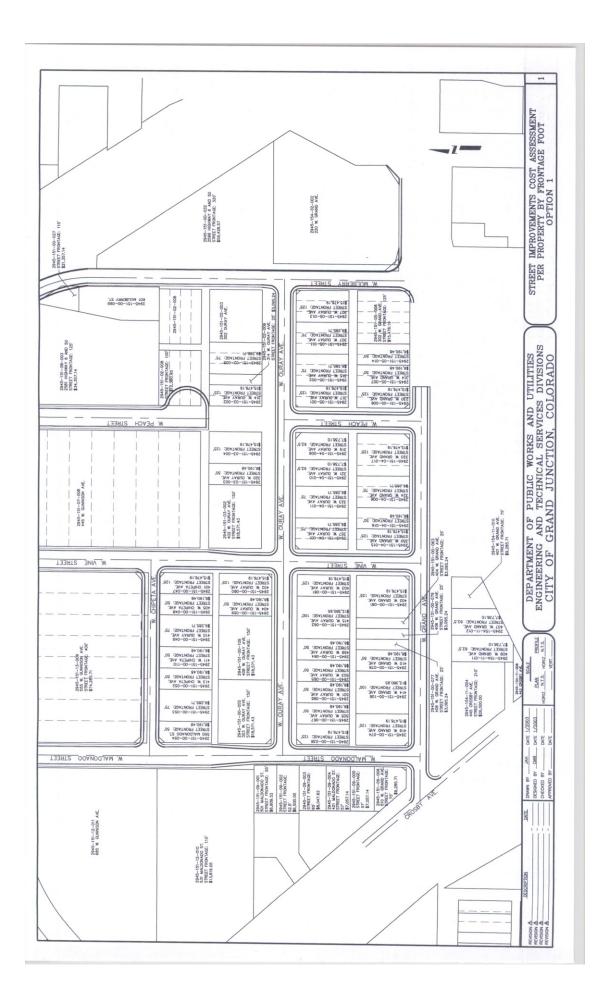

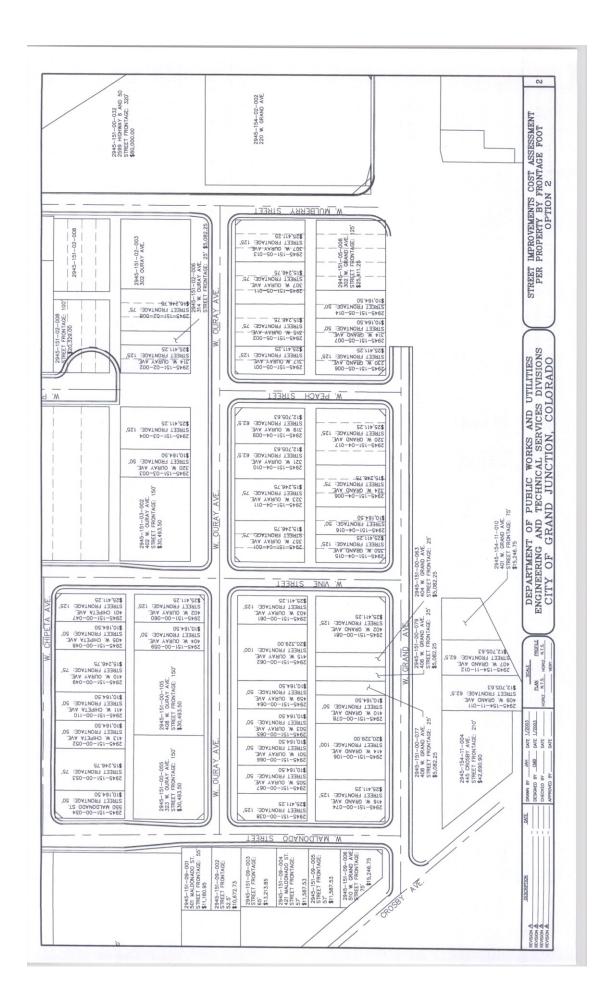

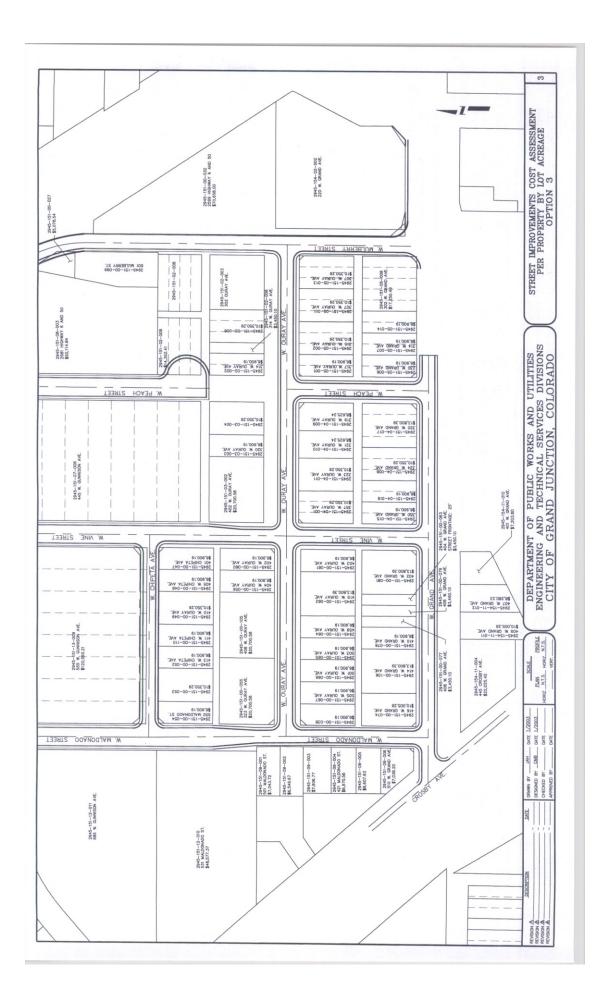
