Since Mr. McMullin was delayed in arriving, Mr. Harper acted as Temporary Chairman and opened the meeting with a short talk to the group of High School Juniors from Grand Junction, Fruita, Palisade, and Central who had participated in Boys and Girls City-County Day and were present in the Auditorium.

Mr. Harper introduced the members of the City Planning Commission and gave a short talk, explaining the duties and aims of the Commission.

At this time Mr. McMullin arrived and assumed the Chair.

Motion was made by Mr. Harper, seconded by Mr. Cheever, that the minutes of the last meeting be approved. Motion carried.

The Commission had received a request from Mr. Thor Peterson for a vacation of a 10 ft. alley on the East end of Bookcliff Manor Subdivision. After discussion, motion was made by Mr. Claud Smith that the Commission refer this to the City Council with the recommendation that the 10 ft. alley immediately East of Lot 14, Bookcliff Manor Subdivision be vacated and title returned to the owner of Lot 14. Motion was seconded by Mr. Harper, and carried.

Mr. Cheever then gave a talk on the Water Program, stressing the need for long-range planning and pointing out on a map the various projects that the City will be developing along this line.

Mr. Gene Allen gave a talk on Zoning; he gave a short history of the organization of the City and County Planning Commissions and stressed that long-range planning includes studies of land use, zoning, and a traffic circulation plan.
