		industry. The construction of local schools demonstrated the relative success of the
		settlements of the area. This building reflects a transition in stylistic influences from the
		more traditional eastern styles to a California and southwest influences. The building is
		also an example of the public works projects that the WPA was instrumental in during this
		period.

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



Grand Junction, Colorado image from 2002 aerial map


