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- 21. General architectural description: <u>This is a simple wood frame house comprised of two volumes. The main ridge runs north/south and the principal façade faces east. The main section has a small recessed area at the northeast corner; the corner of the roof is supported by a single square wood post. The main entry door is located on the back of the recess. A large picture window, with double hungs to each side, is located on the main wall on the right and a single double hung sits on the left. The second volume extends off the north side of the house with a lower hipped roof. The east facing wall has another picture window with flanking casements. The double hungs have a single horizontal muntin in each sash. The eave line is continuous around the perimeter of the building. The south wall has a two double hungs near the center of the wall and a shed roof addition extends off the rear of the house.</u>

Statement of significance: <u>The development in this area is a direct result of the nation's involvement in WWII and the drive for the development of nuclear weapons</u>. <u>The discovery of significant sources of Uranium in the region initiated development in Grand</u>. <u>Junction that supported both the mining of the materials and the administration of programs related to the development of weapons</u>. <u>The building types</u>, <u>materials and neighborhood layout are all indicative of the national trends which were driven by the proliferation of the automobile and the enormous demand for single family homes</u>. <u>House designs departed from the romantic and revival styles that were prevalent in the earlier part of the 20th century and took on a California inspired design that was characterized by simple horizontally proportioned forms</u>. <u>Houses were typically mass produced on previously undeveloped tracts of land at the periphery of earlier</u> development. <u>These groups of houses were typically based on one or two plan types</u>.

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with a limited number of roof and exterior finish variations, further reinforcing the characteristics of mass production. In this particular subdivision there are examples of both repetitive house types and more high style individualized houses. The curvilinear street layout is characteristic of national planning trends and is unusual in this community, where new development tended to extend the existing street grid.

43. Assessment of historic physical integrity related to significance: <u>The loss of the original</u> <u>carport element and the change in siding materials have seriously impacted the integrity.</u> <u>While the building retains its original scale to the street, the loss of the carport element</u> <u>eliminates an important original feature in the character of the neighborhood.</u>

Discuss: The Bookcliff Park Subdivision lies on the periphery of the historic city center and was originally established by single group of investors. The sites were built out to accommodate the rapid growth associated with the Uranium Boom over a short period of time. The architectural styles present in the area represent a significant concentration and continuity of dwellings and a subtle transition of styles over the building period. Few intrusions have been made into the original neighborhood and it retains a high level of integrity.




