This structure is located within the original platted area of Grand Junction and was representative of the 1920s town building.

Bannister's Furniture, now run by members of the Silcox family, is probably the oldest continuously family run business in Mesa County. During its early years it was not unusual during a time when many furniture stores also sold caskets. William H. Bannister, who began the business in 1897, was soon succeeded by his sons, Ollie and Earl K., and daughter Pearl (Mrs. James M.) Silcox.
