architectural description: Two-story commercial brick building covered with stucco along sides and large white tiles on upper level at corner. No evidence of original structure. The recessed entry is at an angle on the corner. Large display windows have metal plating above. Doorway is glass with glass transom. There is an overhanging, metal shed roof across the north side of the building and at the corner. A smaller duplication is across the windows on the 6th Street side of building. The rest of the building on the 6th Street side has been completely stuccoed. Very large lettering fills the upper level at the entry. A hanging sign projects from the left side of the upper level.

historic background (discuss important persons and events associated with this structure)

This structure is located within the original platted area of Grand Junction.

The 600 block Main shows a later period of development than those closer to the railroad and the river. Although the town company built "spec" homes further east on Main to encourage town population to expand more east and north (on Town Company land), it remains to be seen whether they erected commercial buildings with the same intent. First National Bank paid the taxes on this property ca. 1898-1902. Apparently one or two temporary frame structures were on the site at the time. Grand Junction Feed and Implement Company apparently erected a cement-covered frame building that covered lots 1 and 2 and the western half of Lot 3 about 1903. Marcus M. Shores and William E. Dudley were manager and president respectively. They apparently shared the building with O.G. Coen's real estate firm, Lee Realty Co., the Lightning Fruit Grader Co., Grand Junction Canvass Co., and T.M. Hughlitt's real estate firm ca. 1905. Perhaps other interests caused Dudley and Shores to sell the business to leave the farm supply business: by 1907 Shores was county treasurer and Dudley was vicepresident of Union Bank & Trust. The following year, W.E. Rhinehart is listed as the proprietor of the company. About 1914 Dudley became owner of the property - by that time he was vice president of the Bank of Grand Junction. In 1918 Grand Junction Feed Co., Grand Junction Tent & Awning Co., and Western Fruit Grader were in building. On this site, Jasper Fuoco apparently learned the leather repair trade, before going on to found Champion Boots & Shoes. Fashion Bar first appears at 601 Main about 1941, where it stayed for approximately 50 years.
