

LETTER OF AGREEMENT

This agreement entered into this 7th day of July, 1974, between the Colorado West Area Council of Governments and the Board of County Commissioners of Mesa County.

The Council of Governments agrees to provide financial assistance to Mesa County for the preparation of a master plan study and report on the existing and proposed sanitation facilities in the Grand Valley Area of Mesa County. It is understood that the said study shall include but not necessarily be limited to consideration of the following subject areas:

- a. Historical development
- b. Economics
- c. Population
- d. Inventory of existing sanitation facilities
- e. Proposed sanitation facilities, current and future requirements
- f. Project plan
- g. Cost estimates
- h. Legal considerations
- i. Methods of financing
- j. Repayment
- k. Summary and recommendations

It is agreed and understood that in no case, except by prior agreement, will reimbursement from the Council of Governments to the Board of County Commissioners of Mesa County exceed \$16,540.00 under the provisions of this agreement.

The Board of County Commissioners of Mesa County agrees to employ a competent consulting firm to prepare the Mesa County Sanitation System Master Plan Study. It is further agreed that the Board of County Commissioners of Mesa County will afford the Council of Governments opportunity to review and comment on the Master Plan Study by providing notice of all meetings at which time the work of the consultant will be presented. It is also agreed that the Board of County Commissioners of Mesa County will furnish one (1) copy of the Master Plan Study prepared by the consultant.

In witness hereof, the Colorado West Area Council of Governments and the Board of County Commissioners of Mesa County has executed this agreement on the day and year first above written.

Dear Mr. Anderson:

This is in reply to your letter of June 23, 1974, concerning the availability of current information regarding grant assistance for treatment plants and collection systems.

The EPA administers grants for construction of sewage treatment systems as provided by the Federal Water Pollution Control Act Amendments of 1972. Eligible under the Act are collection sewers, however, it is the State's responsibility each year to establish a priority list for future projects in the State. The priority list is used to determine which projects will be funded from the State's allotment. The State assigns Federal funds to municipalities beginning at the top of the list and proceeding from higher to lower priority projects until the fiscal year funds have been completely allocated. In determining where a project is placed on the priority list, the State considers the severity of the pollution problem, the population affected, the need for high quality waters and national priority as well as total funds available. At this time, treatment facilities receive the highest priority since Colorado does not have sufficient funds to cover all the needs of their various communities. When this list is established, the State Agency holds a public hearing on the list, and submits this list to the Environmental Protection Agency for approval.

For further information regarding the State and EPA's role in the tendering of grants, you may wish to contact Mr. Frank J. Rozich, Director, Water Quality Control Division, Colorado Department of Health, 4210 East 11th Avenue, Denver, Colorado 80220. Mr. Rozich can also furnish you information regarding Colorado's grant program.

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Loan funds may be available from the Farmers Home Administration, U. S. Department of Agriculture. I suggest that you contact Mr. Leo French, State Director at 1 Diamond Plaza, 2490 W. 26th Avenue, Denver, Colorado 80211 for information on their program. In addition, under the Federal Water Pollution Control Act Amendments of 1972, there is established the Environmental Financing Authority. However, obtaining a loan under this authority, requires obtaining a grant for the construction of waste treatment works before the loan provision can become effective. Enclosed for your information is a copy of pages 20788 through 20799 of the Federal Register published on June 14, 1974, which contain the regulations promulgated by EPA to carry out the Environmental Financing Act.
