City halts sewer taps in suburbs

The Grand Junction City Council Wednesday imposed a temporary moratorium on sewer taps outside of the city limits.

outside of the city limits. The moratorium was an in-direct result of a request by the developers of Green Meadows Subdivision for city sewer serv-ice. The subdivision will be lo-cated near Roads 26½ and G and the sewer line will tie into a cover line at Road 26½

sewer line at Road 261/2. Public Works Director Jim Pat-terson said his department has been working on an agreement with the developers for several months. He said although the developers were not encouraged to use the city line, they were not dis-

couraged, either. Council members expressed

concern the present sewer plant may reach capacity in the near fu-ture, before the proposed Val-leywide Sewer Plant is constructed. Plans and proposals

for the plant are currently before the Colorado Water Quality Con-trol Commission. "We do have to set a prior-ity...we have to establish a posi-tion we will not accept any more agreements until the Water Qual-ity Control Commission tells us what we can do." Councilman what we can do," Councilman Karl Johnson said. The council agreed, and voted Councilman

not to accept any further agree-ments to provide sewer taps to persons outside the city until a timetable for planning and con-struction can be arranged for the

Valleywide Sewer Plant. The council, however, did ac-cept the agreement with the Green Meadows Subdivision, and will also allow existing houses on the Poland Heights Subdivision to tie into the city's waste water treatment system via pumps and sewer lines constructed by the Ridges Metropolitan District.

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
