One and one half story bungalow with wood siding; gable roof with asphalt shingles; covered and enclosed front porch spans building front; stucco piers support porch roof; front gable dormer with two 4/4 windows; 1/1 windows rest of building; chimney west end of front roof; concrete foundation; shrubs and grass; sidewalk leading to front porch entrance.

George Crawford selected the town site on Sept. 26 1881, incorporated the Grand Junction Town Company, and platted a section of land for town development in typical grid fashion. Boundaries were established at North and South avenues and First and Twelth streets. Corners were set aside for churches, blocks for school buildings (between Fifth and Sixth streets and White and Rood avenues), parks - Maple, Walnut Chestnut and Cottonwood (names later changed to Whitman, Emerson, Hawthorn, and Washington, respectively) - were designed for each quarter section of the original town plat. This structure is located within the original platted area and is representative of the 1910s town building era.
