architectural description: Two-story, simple Italianate design typical of the early 20th Century commercial architecture. The first floor of the front facade has four storefront bays, each with a large display window and a single wood and glass door. Clerestories are boarded with wood, but original glazing pattern is still evident in the remaining nuntins. At the south end of the bays is a double-door entry with glass transom to the second floor. The second story of the front facade has eight evenly-spaced, oneover-one new windows and two-over-two window located over the second floor entry. The windows are accented by sandstone caps and the arched window features a Romanesque arched voussoir also in The front rises above the actual roofline of the sandstone. building and has an elaborate sheet metal cornice topped by a brick parapet with inlaid brick panels and a decorative sandstone cap. The back facade of the building is very plain and functional with two entries and two upper floor windows. The side facades are not as detailed as the front, each having only a few simple windows. The stone accents are repeated on the second floor window of the north, alley-facing facade. A wing was added in 1934 which is now 560 Colorado. It has an angled corner and commercial display windows.

construction history: (description, names, dates, etc. relating demajor additions or alterations to original structure) The original two-story recongular structure of the Schiesswohl building was constructed in phases with different contractors used for each phase. In 1925 Schiesswohl built a filling station for and leased the two adjacent lots to the south of his building. A larger station was completed in 1934.

historic background (discuss important persons and events associated with this structure)

Jacob H. Schiesswohl was a successful real estate and insurance businessman in Grand Junction in the late 1890s and early 1900s. He built himself and office with additional space he could lease for added business income.

statement of significance:

Contributing; The Schiesswohl Building is architecturally significant because it is the best preserved example of a structure of this period and type in the Grand Junction downtown area. Its location just off of Main Street saved it from the ravages of alterations suffered by most other, more preominent buildings of its period. Historically, the Schiesswohl Buiding has mirrored the prevailing conditions of the local economy, serivng at verious times a wide variety of office, retail, commercial, and even residential uses.
