architectural description: Two-story, commercial building with marbled tile on second level which has three large offset windows with a metal awning. Tile and glass is on the left side. The entrance is recessed with display windows with marblized tile kickplate. A metal shed awning is over the entry with a small sign. An Alpine Bank sign is on the roof.

historic background (discuss important persons and events associated with this structure)

This structure is located within the original platted area

of Grand Junction and was representative of the late 1920s town building.

Like lots 19 and 20, James Kent owned the east 18 feet of Lot 21 in 1898. Fellow pioneer Ellen Fletcher owned the west 7 feet of Lot 21 and the east 8 feet of Lot 22. Improvements to each structure were valued at \$75 that year. Fletcher's millinery shop appears to have been in her building as early as 1890. (The Fletchers figure in early Grand Junction history. Robert was a blacksmith by 1887, and county treasurer ca. 1894-1896. Ellen's millinery shop provided hats and notions to Grand Junction the final decade of the 19th Century. One son, George, had a plumbing shop on Colorado for many years. His daughter Marian served as Walter Walker's secretary for most of her working career.) In 1909 Mesa County Loan & Real Estate had moved into 444 Main, and one of its principals, Clarence Lough, paid the building's taxes. R.E. Fletcher owned 442, renting it to Peter Mogensen's Rocky Mountain Tea Company, Mrs. J.B. Gover's restaurant, and C.S. Turner's cigar store. About 1920, A.E. Templeman may have purchased 444 from the lending agency, putting his jewelry store in the same store front, alongside apparently newly organized Modern Building & Loan Association (Charles McCary was president and D.B. Wright was treasurer). Victor Garms became an officer of Valley Building & Loan by 1930; it and his insurance agency occupied 444 Main. Fletcher's building may have undergone an extensive upgrade, jumping from \$410 to \$7500 in 1931. Soon optometrist Walter Stevens occupied 442, where he stayed through 1949. Garms continued to sell insurance and operate what had become Valley Federal Savings and Loan by 1935. In 1995, the financial institution acquired the former Fletcher building, and apparently combined the two with an extensive remodeling.
