Built in 1906, facade altered during the late 1940s or early
1950s, corrugated metal tacked on to "modernize"; renovation to historic facade occurred in 1982, architect Robert Jenkins, dance floor restored and all shop interiors taken back to their original style. Altered transoms and kickplates.

historic background (discuss important persons and events associated with this structure)

The Margery Building has been an all-purpose commercial building throughout its history. It was financed by Verner Z. Reed, a Colorado Springs millionaire who invested extensively in the Grand Junction area and was built by W. C. Boyer, a local architect. The building was named for Reed's only daughter, Margery. The lower story consists of five store fronts which have been occupied by various businesses ranging from groceries and meat markets to jewelers and barbers. The upper story housed offices and a ballroom dance floor where many local dances were

held, from the marathons of the 1930s to the high school proms of the 1940s and 1950s.

Contributing; This building is on the National Register of Historic Places.

The Margery Building is significant because it represents the 1900-1910 building period and has survived nearly intact from its original form. This building has served as a retail and office building since its inception. Its builder, Verner Z. Reed, was an important financier in many regions of the state, including the Grand Valley, where he financed several buildings, orchards and other projects. The Margery Building has been nicknamed "Downtown's Grand Lady" because, of all the surviving commercial buildings, this one has continued to represent the original character and use of the building.
