architectural description: One-story beige brick commercial structure with three separate entrances containing two businesses. The upper level is brick with simple brick detail. Lower level has been covered with painted wood. Kickplate on 625 is brick. Centered doorway is wood with upper portion glass and wood lattice work. A sign projects above entry. 635 has two recessed entrances and wood kickplates. Signage on windows.

This structure is located within the original platted area

of Grand Junction and was representative of the 1920s town building.

These 3 lots may have been owned by several Grand Junction Town Company investors before Isabel and George Durrie bought Lots 7 and 8 (Currie figures in the Currie/Raso Building and the Currie Canning Company) about 1900. The J./A. McCulloch Implement & Feed Co. apparently built the forerunner of today's commercial building, before William H. Bannister, owner of Bannister's Furniture, acquired the property. Businessmen sold and repaired cars, motorcycles, and their component parts here from about 1912 until 1927. McCague and Jennie Copeland purchased the 3 buildings in 1924, and had moved their Copeland's M System Stores Co. into 625 Main by 1928. Later it was called Copeland Grocery No.2. Other groceries occupied 625 for several years after "Mack's" death in 1932. It was also the location of Knight Appliance Shop (before moving into the 700 block of Main) during the 1940s and 1950s. The property has remained in the Copeland family for more than 70 years.
