architectural description: One-story stuccoed commercial building remodeled to a mission style. Upper level facade is painted stucco. Street level has been covered with brick with display windows and awning of wood shingles. Center entrance is recessed with glass door and transom. Recessed door on right is glass and leads to second business. East side of building along alley is stucco with small arched windows trimmed in brick. There are two wood shingled awnings on painted wood brackets.

historic background (discuss important persons and events associated with this structure)

This structure is located within the original platted area of Grand Junction and was representative of the 1920s town building.

This lot probably saw its first building, a small one about 1909. At that time it was owned by James and Mary Bucklin, who also owned several other buildings in the core of Grand Junction. Grand Junction Tent & Awning and the Western Fruit Grader apparently moved here after leaving their 601 Main location. In the 1920s the building saw several automobile-related small businesses, before its purchase by photographer Frank Dean ca. 1928; Dean may have been responsible for adding the addition to the rear. By 1930 Dean's Camera shop was 639, managed by Frank's son Preston. Preston and his close friend Al Look reportedly took the first aerial photographs of Grand Mesa. About 1946 the younger Dean apparently sold the building and business to Theodore & Hanna Fouts; They renamed it Midwest Photo Service. For a short time it was managed by Robert C. Gilmore, who also managed the elder Dean's business. By 1951 Walter Stevens owned the structure, soon installing his optometry business in 637, while Midwest Photo stayed at 639, now owned by Roy and Mary Petersen.
