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ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION: One story with cross gables. Foundation skirted with wood shingle siding. Low concrete ramp leads to a screened porch with an extended shed roof across the facade. Battered porch base and half-wall have wood shingle siding. Five piers and two responds around porch also have shingle siding. Segmental arch heads are on the porch screen openings. Screen door. Front door is paneled with a large light. Windows around house are mainly double hung wood sash, one-over-one. Inside the porch, a south facade window has a five light transom. On the south elevation is a high, horizontal window with leaded glass in a lozenge pattern. Also on the south elevation is a bay with hip roof and paired windows on the face. On the north wing is a smaller, shed roof wing with pairs of small, single light sliding windows. Light gray wood shingle siding and trim. Dark gray composition shingle roof. The eaves have fascia boards. A short, gabled wing is on the facade. A hip roof domer on the facade has a three light window, and wood shingle siding. Domer and bay have exposed rafter ends. A gabled wing on the north elevation has a flared east slope.

The large lawn has many small cedar trees. Pollard trees along the south lawn and a very large cottonwood is behind the house. Low evergreens
