ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION: One story with flared hip roof. Foundation covered with wide wood planks painted beige. Concrete steps with pipe railing lead up to sunporch/entry with hip roof which extends across facade. Ribbed balustrade in front of flush siding on porch half wall. Four Doric half columns with pedestals and two responds. Porch glazed with large fixed panes with wooden frames and has flush wooden door with large oval light and two narrow side lights. Principal door is wood panel with large light. Double hung wood sash windows around the house with storms. Projecting bay on west elevation. Shed roof wing across rear. Beige simple drop siding. Porch balustrade, fascia and window surrounds are painted blue. Fishscale shingles painted variations of blue surround porch door and side lights. Brown composition shingle roof. Brick chimneys on hip roof ridge and north slope. Hip roof dormer on facade has paired windows. Landscaped with lawn. Two large trees in front yard. Garage with front gable, brown composition shingle roof, and beige wide aluminum siding has been converted to living quarters. Garage door replaced with flush wooden door with oval light, transom and two narrow side lights. HISTORICAL BACKGROUND (discuss important persons and events associated with this building): The first occupants in this house, ca. 1905, were Daisy and Louis Breeze, the County Assessor. After her husband's death in 1905, Daisy Lucas Breeze continued to occupy the house, at times using it as a boarding house through ca. 1918. Florence and Chauncey Bullock, a U.S. postal carrier, owned/resided in the house ca. 1921-1946.
