ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION: One story with cross gables, rear gable ridge slightly lower. Rusticated concrete block foundation. Wood steps, with simple 2x4 wood railing, lead to an open porch with hip roof placed in the elbow formed by the north and east gable extensions. Wooden stats for half-wall. Four wood, full height, Tuscan columns. Door is wood and has a full light with beveled edge. Wood steps in the south elevation lead to a small rear porch integral in south east corner of house. Vinyl simple drop siding on half-wall. Rear door is wood with four lights. Double hung wood sash windows around house with aluminum storm windows. Shed roof addition on the southwest corner of house. Projecting bay, with diamond shingle shed roof, extends into upper gable on east elevation. Gray, simple drop vinyl siding. Window and door surrounds, corner boards, porch wall and columns are painted white. Alternating diamond and fishscale wood shingles. Gable faces are salmon and rose. Grey composition shingle roof with boxed eaves. Vergeboards terminate in rondelles. Brick chimneys on front and rear ridge.

Landscaped with grass lawn and small trees. Evergreens flank front porch steps. Blue ash trees in parking. Two car garage with flat roof, grey simple drop wood siding, sliding door and double hinged door, is a cut down barn.

HISTORICAL BACKGROUND (discuss important persons and events associated with this building): The first known owner of the house, constructed ca. 1890, was Francis Wheeler, ca. 1898-1901. In 1902, the house was owned and occupied by Emmett B. Moore, president of the Grand Junction Business College's Commercial Department. The owners/occupants in 1903-1904 were farmer C. Lindsay, and Orpha Horr. Marcus D. Claypoole, a shoemaker for H.A. Jepsen and T. P. Conley, and later a rancher, was the owner/resident ca. 1909-1923, and were the renters ca. 1924-1937. Arty Rowlands (widow of John) owned the house from 1924-1942, and was the occupant, 1939-1942. Carl Chapman, a dry cleaner, and his wife Clara, were the owners/occupants ca. 1945-1988.


