ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION: One and a half story with side gable roof. Concrete steps with wrought iron railings lead to screened porch with extended shed roof across west three-quarters of facade. Porch half-wall is shingled down to ground level. Seven half height posts, 4 x 4s with decorative brackets across porch facade. Wood paneled screen door. French main door. Windows around house are double hung wood sash, four vertical lights over one, with metal storm windows. On east and west facade are ribbons of four windows. Two shed domers with exposed rafter ends in facade, with fixed windows divided into five vertical lights. Pale yellow staggered shingle siding up to level of window silts. The upper walls have pale yellow false bevel wood siding. Window frames, porch railing, porch brackets, screen and main door, gutters and downspouts are white. Window surrounds, corner boards, porch posts, door frames and raking cornices are blue. Brown composition shingle roof with overhanging eaves. Brick chimney on south slope. Full height brick fireplace chimney penetrates overhanging eave on west gable wall. Projecting bay window with shed roof and exposed rafter ends on east gable wall. Long porte cochere with exposed rafters extending from east gable wall. Shed roof supported by 6 x 6 posts with simple braces.

Landscaped with lawn and variety of young and mature trees around yard. Tall wood fence along east side of yard encloses entire backyard as well.

It was owned/occupied ca. 1910-1919 by G. Adora and James Hards, a barber. Mary and Frank Medicino, Cowboy Boot Factory and cigars, were the owners/occupants ca. 1921-1923. Dorothy and Pete Jouflas, a well-known local sheepman, were the owners ca. 1924 to at least 1951. They were the occupants ca. 1926-1931, and ca. 1935 through 1951. Bessie and William O'Brien, a fireman, were the tenants ca. 1932-1934.


