ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION: One story with cross gables. Battered foundation which tapers to sill level. Concrete front steps approach shed roof porch from side. Piers of steps and half-wall of porch, have wire cut brick with concrete coping. Entry porch/sunroom extends across west half of facade. Lowest six courses are red brick, above that is brown brick. At corners of porch are brick piers, which taper inward as they rise. Atop them are elephantine wood columns which support the porch roof, and continue the inward taper. Door is paneled with three vertical lights. Porch glazing is aluminum framed windows with large single lights. Other windows around house are double hung wood sash three, five and six vertical lights over one. Aluminum framed storm windows around house. Light gray narrow lapped siding. Window and door surrounds, string courses, corner boards, bargeboards and porch columns are medium gray. Light grey composition shingle roof with exposed rafters and gray knee braces under eaves. Tan brick fireplace chimney on west gable wall. The lowest six courses of fireplace chimney are red wire cut brick.

Landscaped with lawn, trimmed trees to west of facade. Two locust trees in parking. Natural wood fence around back yard. One car garage at rear with front gable, narrow lapped siding, and composition shingle roof. Garage door is paneled, swings outward.
