

ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION: One story with cross gables. Battered foundation, concrete front steps with wrought iron railings. Gabled, screened front porch on center half of facade. Siding on half-wall and squared half columns of front corners of porch. Paneled front door with large light. Windows are double hung wood sash, five and six vertical lights over one. White false bevel siding. Door and window surrounds, corner boards, screen door and screen framing, bargeboards and knee braces are gray blue. Roof is red composition shingles. Bargeboards and knee braces under eaves. Brick chimney on north slope.

Landscaped with lawn, ash on west facade. Blue ash in parking. Two car garage at rear. Side gable. White false bevel siding and blue trim like main house. Older red composition roof. Two garage doors are contemporary metal with small light. Door swing upward.
