ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION: Two story house with concrete foundation and flat roof with parapets. Semi-circular, green painted concrete front steps with curved portice overhead, lead to front door paneled with fan light. Second story is set back on north and west sides and opens to rooftop terraces with green pipe railings on terraces. The asymmetrical facade has three windows to the east. To the west, a ribbon of windows. The west corner of house is curved. The glass panes of the corner window also curve. Metal awning frame around curved corner. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE (briefly justify the significance checked above): One of the few International style houses in Grand Junction and the most ambitious. Plain stucco surfaces, curved corner with a curved window, roof terraces, and garage incorporated into house are features that identify this International style.

This house is located in the proposed Merchant/Professional Residential District. Between 1904 and 1940, the city of Grand Junction expanded to the east of the original square mile. Merchants and professionals settled into this area creating a distinctive neighborhood.
