HISTORICAL BACKGROUND (discuss important persons and events associated with this building): Orchard Mesa is a triangle of desert land between the Gunnison and Colorado Rivers and the Grand Mesa. By 1890, orchards were planted by homesteaders as they settled into the area. Today, the orchards are receding under the pressure of subdivisions. This house, owned by Leona Frohmm 1936-1938, and Oma Lumbardy, ca. 1938-1944, was constructed in ca. 1933. It was the residence of Kenneth Harris, a miner, in 1946. Through the early 1950s it is difficult to determine where residents lived on Orchard Mesa as numbered street addresses did not appear in the Grand Junction City Directories with any regularity. 
