
ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION: Two story with gambrel roof and side gables. Concrete front steps, with concrete block piers, lead to full width sunporch under principal roof, Secondary entrance on south end of sunporch. Sunporch is glazed with rows of large, fixed sash, lights. Siding on half-wall. Metal frame screen door over French door with sidelights. Windows around house are double hung wood sash, three or five vertical lights over one. Projecting bay window with shed roof on south elevation. Narrow lapped siding and trim is white, except for black window screen frames. Gray composition shingle roof. Fascia boards. East and west slopes have full width, continuous shed roof dormers. Stucco fireplace chimney on north gable wall painted black. Two large cypress flank front steps, ivy manties fireplace chimney. A fir and two large cottonwoods on lawn. Additional construction or modifications not noted in Assessor's Records. HISTORICAL BACKGROUND (discuss important persons and events associated with this building): Orchard Mesa is a triangle of desert land between the Gunnison and Colorado Rivers and the Grand Mesa. By 1890, orchards were planted by homesteaders as they settled into the area. Today, the orchards are receding under the pressure of subdivisions. Constructed ca. 1913, this residence was first owned by Mrs. J. L. Myer. Acquired by the Fred and Maybelle C. Clymer family in ca. 1922, and is still owned by the family. Through the early 1950s it is difficult to determine where residents lived on Orchard Mesa as numbered street addresses did not appear in the Grand Junction City Directories with any regularity. 
