Arched front door is paneled with small light. Small metal awning over door. Large picture window on east side of facade. Other windows are double hung wood sash, one-over-one, with plank shutters. Wood shake siding is blue; window and door surrounds, cornices, comice returns, shutters, front door are white. Front screen door is red. Gray composition shingle roof with brick chimney on south slope. Landscaped with lawn and arborvitae at both corners of facade. Gravel across foundation and along front walk with planter tubs. Two ash trees in parking. Garage at rear, ca. 1941, with asbestos siding, front gable, and original double garage doors.
