ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION: Two story, hip roof with front gable. Concrete block foundation and concrete steps. Open porch with hip roof across facade. Wood shingled half-wall. Eight white turned half columns across facade, paneled door with large light. Windows are double hung wood sash, one-over-one. Drop siding is gray buff. Window and door surrounds, corner boards, porch columns, friezes, cornices and return cornices are white. Roof is light green composition shingles with boxed eaves and cornices. Front gable has Palladian style window and return cornices. Brick chimney on south slope.

Landscaped with gravel around building, small front lawn and rose bush on lawn. Two maples, two Trees of Heaven by west elevation. Sign board near sidewalk announces the business within. Two car shotgun garage at rear with white asbestos shingle siding, gray composition roof and wood swinging doors on each end.

More commonly known as the "Dalias Rooms," this building has always served the community as a rooming house. Benjamin Snyder, a county commissioner, owned it from ca.1914-1920. The property was owned by Lewis and Herminia Shubina from 1921 to 1931. In 1935, Antonio Coscorroza, a Basque sheepman, and his wife Toribia, purchased the property.
