

ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION: One and a half story with side gables and battered foundation. Concrete steps and stoop with white wrought iron railing. French door with side lights on east side of facade. Gabled portico with knee braces. Short wing with gable on west elevation. Windows are double hung wood sash, five vertical lights over one. Yellow false bevel siding with white door and window surrounds and bargeboards. Brown composition shingle roof with exposed rafter ends, and bargeboards with sharp points. Wide dormers on both slopes with shed roofs and ribbons of small windows. Brick chimney on south slope.

House is set far back on lot. Large front lawn is surrounded by a chain link fence. Flower bed with bulbs and annuals along east fence. Large fruitless mulberry on east lawn edge.

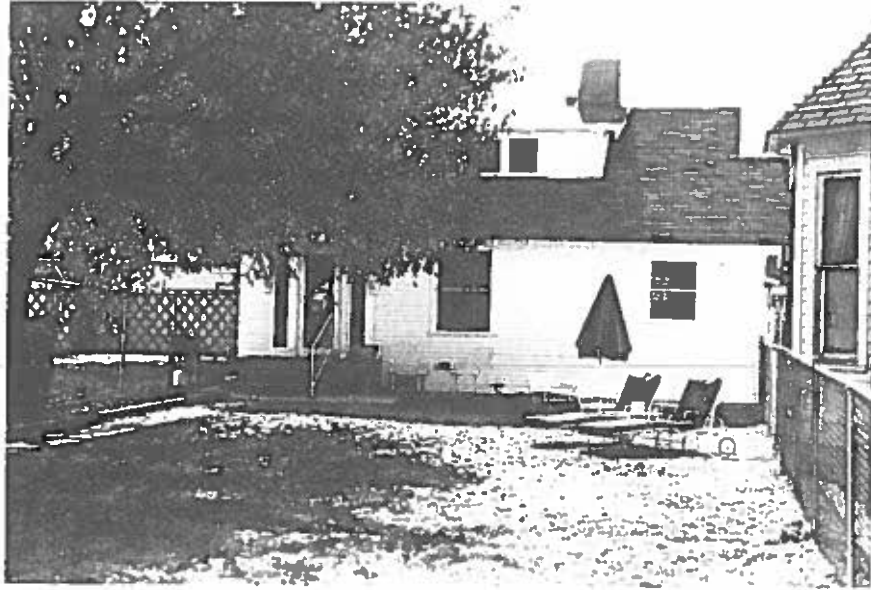
