ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION: One story, hip roof with cross gables. Concrete block foundation. Concrete steps with wrought iron railing. Glazed sunporch with hip roof extends across 3/4 of facade. Glazing is large, metal framed single lights. Flush siding on half-wall. Four squared, full height columns across porch front. Front door is paneled with large light. Windows are double hung wood sash, one-over-one. Gray simple drop siding. Door and window surrounds, corner boards, water table, friezes, cornices and raking cornices are white. Foundation is painted pink and steps are green. Light gray composition shingle roof. Gables on north and west slopes are pedimented with a kick. Gray cedar shingles on gable face. Front gable has ribbon of thee small windows. Gray painted brick fireplace chimney on west gable wall. Brick chimney on south slope.

Landscaped with lawn and flower beds in wide side yard to the west. Picket fence along sidewalk frontage of lawn and along alley. Large cedar tree in parking area.

Two story barn by alley with front gable, light gray composition shingle roof, gray simple drop siding, white door and window surrounds, and batten swinging doors for two cars. Overhead is a batten door to hay mow.

Ratliff, chief of the Grand Junction Public Works, were the owners ca. 1940-1941, and for a short period of time, the occupants. Johanna and Adolph Rettig were the owners/occupants ca. 1945-1952.


