Sullivan was the occupant ca. 1909-1911, and the owner ca. 1907-1914. From ca. 1914-1919, the owners/occupants were Lena W. and William Watters an engineer for the Grand Valley National Bank. From ca. 1919-1931, there were a series of absentee owners and renters including an employee for the State Home and Training School and a laborer. John L. and Minnie Moore, the renters in ca. 1930, were the owners/occupants ca. 1931-1939. Clara Miller was the owner ca. 1940-1945, and Lena and Cecil Dickey, a salesman for the Main Motor Company, the occupants. 
