
ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION: Vernacular Masonry apartment, two stories and basement. Hip roof. Foundation of rusticated concrete blocks, now partially covered with cast stone. Concrete steps with rusticated concrete block piers with stone coping. Porch extends across center half of facade. Brick columns with stone capitals at each corner, and flanking front steps. Front porch has second floor deck with wrought iron railing, and access from door on second floor. Front door is paneled, with large beveled light and beveled single pane side lights. Windows are double hung wood sash, one-over-one. Brick relieving arches over every, window, and stone sills. High basement has double hung windows, 4' high, with relieving arches. Brick walls, stone coping and sills are painted mauve. Window and door casings, boxed eaves and cornices are brown. Gray composition shingle roof. Hip roof dormer on south slope has walls with yellow shingle siding. Small window on face of dormer, flanked by louvered wood vents. Yellow brick chimney on east slope. A cedar tree on each side of steps and elm on east yard. Two elms and a clump of evergreen in parking area. HISTORICAL BACKGROUND (discuss important persons and events associated with this building): This building was constructed ca. 1909 and known as the Colorado Apartments by 1941. A. M. Nafe was the first owner/resident ca. 1909-1918. Ethel and Charles H. Wilkinsen, treasurer of Western Shale Oil Company, were the next owners, ca. 1919-1927. The Wilkinsen's were occupants in ca. 1921-1922. Although the directory does not identify the house as a rooming house or apartment by 1926, there were four residents listed as living in the house in addition to the owners. Minnle and Otto Brutsche, a meatcutter, were the owners, residents, and landlords from ca. 1931-1946.
