ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION: One story hip roof with gabled front wing. Foundation skirted with siding. Concrete steps with gray wrought iron railings lead up to gabled porch across center three-quarter of facade. Porch half-wall and three columns are shingled. Slender, ornamental collar braces on heads of porch columns. Front door is paneled and has a very large light. Windows are double hung wood sash, one-over-one, with metal frame storm windows. Shallow projecting bay window on east elevation under eave of principal roof. Gray narrow drop siding, foundation, and wood shingles on porch and gable face. Door and window surrounds, bargeboards, knee braces, corner boards and steps are a darker gray. Gray composition shingle roof with flared eaves. Exposed rafter ends and bargeboard ends are rounded. Knee braces under front gable eaves have ornamental cuts. Sunburst on the overhang at apex of the gable. Brick chimney on north slope.

Landscaped with lawn, a row of spirea on east facade, and locust trees.

One car garage at rear with front gable, gray composition shingle roof, gray narrow drop siding, and batten swinging garage doors.

HISTORICAL BACKGROUND (discuss Important persons and events associated with this building): The first owner/occupant was P.K. Fisher, ca. 1908-1909. Edna B. and O.D. Williams, secretary-manager of the Independent Abstract Company, were the next owners/residents, ca. 1910-1919. Owners Alice and J. Wilbur LeVan resided in the house ca. 1921-1925. They were followed by Mollie and Charles Brodie, a fiscal agent from the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation, ca. 1926-1928. Tenants while Josephine Beck was the absentee owner, ca. 1929-1940, included a railroader, a jeweler, and an assistant entomologist for the U.S. Bureau of Entomology. An administrative assistant for the U.S. Soil Conservation Service was the tenant ca. 1941, and Maude and Reverend M. Allen Keith, the owners. Nellie and William Harris, a constable, were the owners/occupants ca. 1945-1957.


